

SANKEY HOPES TO GET HELP

EVIDENCE OF GERMAN BOATBUILDER IS NOW PIVOTAL POINT IN MURDER APPEAL

Says the Vancouver Province in reporting the Sankey appeal in Vancouver this week.

Witnesses, whom Joseph Sankey believes will aid him in his fight for life and appeal for a new trial, will attend before the Court of Appeal for cross-examination by A. M. Johnson, K.C., crown counsel.

With the consent of Mr. J. Edward Bird, counsel for Sankey, Mr. Johnson requested this course when Sankey's appeal opened, and the court ordered the witnesses to attend, either at this sitting, or if that cannot be arranged, then the Court of Appeal will hold a special sitting for the purpose.

On the application of Mr. Johnson for the crown, Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald on Monday afternoon ordered a further reprieve from Wednesday until May 25.



TALKED TO TEACHER

In support of the application for a new trial, Mr. Bird submitted an affidavit from Lewis W. Patmore, who was the accused's counsel at the trial.

Mr. Patmore stated that Mrs. Constance Cox, Indian interpreter, of Hazelton, had informed him that she had a conversation with Charles Reinhold, Port Essington boat builder and a crown witness. Reinhold allegedly said that on May 23, a Sunday morning, when Miss Chisholm was killed, he talked to her as she was walking towards a mill, where Reinhold had some logs.

Shortly afterwards, according to the affidavit, the man visited the millsite and called to the girl, but there was no response.


