MUCH ACTIVITY IN INTERIOR MINES

MUCH GOING ON IN ADDITION TO FAMOUS RICHFIELD AND DUTHIE PROPERTIES

Beside the operations on the now famous Richfield and Duthie mines, the former at Topley and the latter at Smithers, there is much mining activity in the central interior according to word reaching the city. New finds and deals are being reported and the outlook is most encouraging.

An important new discovery of galena ore, assaying \$150 to the ton, has been made on the Fox mineral claim located about four thousand feet south of the Richfield mine in the Topley region. Messrs. Gale and Lifton of Smithers have taken an option on this claim from the locator, Seymour Tom, an Indian and have also taken a bond on the Blue Grouse claim, which adjoins, from James Dyer. The two claims are to be surveyed immediately and development work will follow.

Frank Taylor, locator of the Topley mine, has announced in Vancouver that he is organizing a company to develop a large number of other claims he has bonded in the same region.

Cushing Moore, engineer in charge of the Lucky Jim mine in the Slokan district, has been in the interior this week to make an inspection of progress on the development work under way by the Cassiar Crown Mining Co. on the Grouse Mountain properties east of Telkwa. It is understood that a long tunnel is to be driven this summer to develop promising ore bodies at greater depth.

Word has been received that E. G. Brown of Vancouver has taken a bond on the Little Joe group of claims on Driftwood Creek, north of Smithers. Mr. Brown proposes to work the property himself and ship the ore to smelter, the property being within three miles of the Cronin mine road. Development already effected on the property includes a 200-foot tunnel.

EMPIRE EDUCATIONISTS TO GATHER IN LONDON

Prince of Wales Hopes to Attend Meeting in June

LONDON, April 1.—The Prince of Wales hopes to be present at the opening on June 20 of the Imperial Conference on Education which meets again after four years in London. Delegates, who are all professional educationists, or officially connected with educational administration, will attend from all parts of the Empire.

The long and varied agenda divides the subjects to be discussed into five groups, which cover every phase of education, especially in its relation to conditions in the Dominions.

Both the moving picture and broadcasting figure in the "New Ideas and Developments" group of subjects on the agenda. Their discussion should produce results of particular value.
