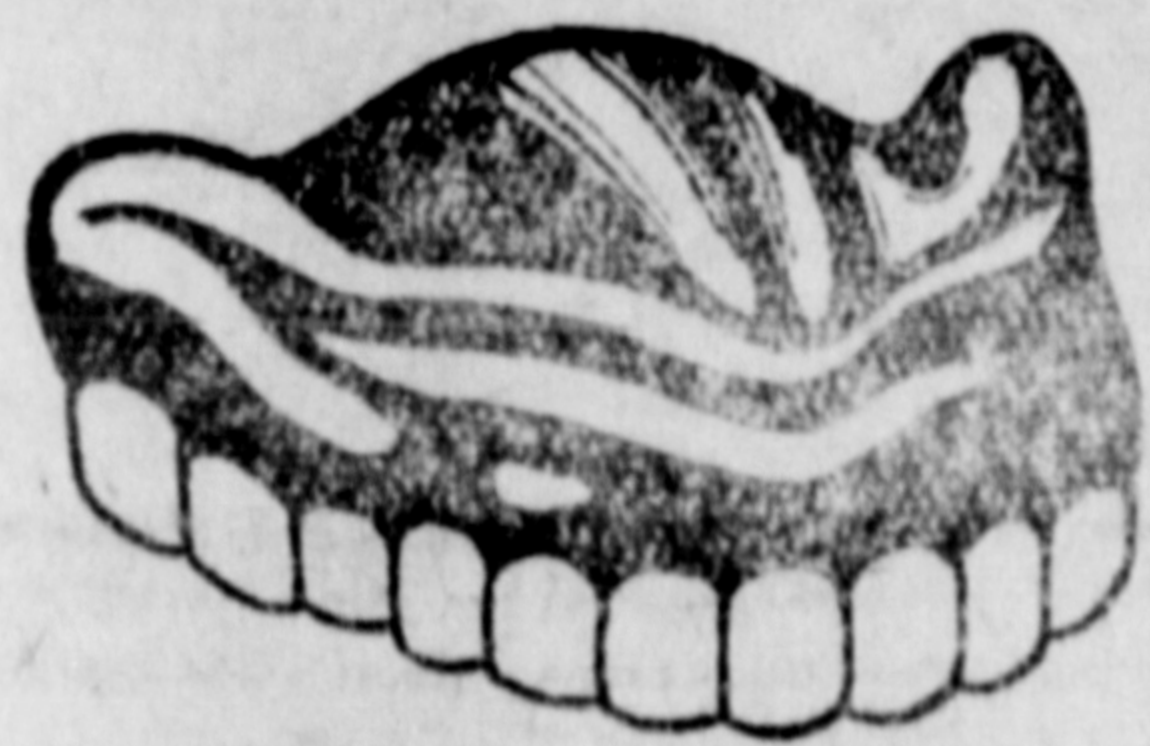

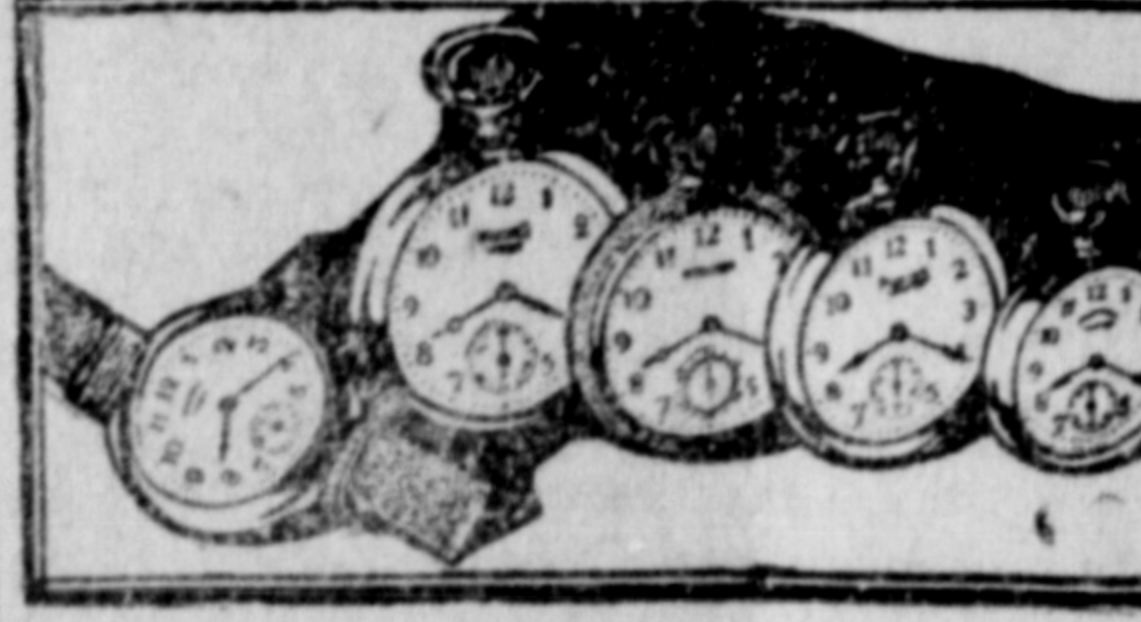

OBSERVANCE OF DOMINION DAY

MEETING LAST NIGHT OF GENERAL EXECUTIVE RECEIVED REPORTS OF WELL ADVANCED PLANS

Plans for a fitting celebration in Prince Rupert on July 1 and 2 of the Diamond Jubilee of Canada's Confederation were further advanced at a meeting in the city council chamber last night of the general executive committee with A. J. Prudhomme, chairman, presiding.

An optimistic report was presented by L. M. Fuller for the finance committee. Progress had been made in the matter of collections and some handsome donations had been promised.

The secretary, H. A. Breen, was instructed to engage the Boys' Band for July 1 and 2 at its regular fees.

For the children's sports committee, G. W. Johnstone submitted a program of 27 events with prizes totalling approximately \$225.

The senior sports committee, through H. R. Love, presented a program of fifteen proposed track and field events with prizes estimated at a total of \$200 exclusive of the tug-of-war, proposed baseball games between Ketchikan and Prince Rupert, and Dominion Day cup soccer final. The tug-of-war it was decided, would be open to teams of nine men each, the pull to be on the ground and not on cleats.

The floats committee, through R. V. G. LePine, submitted a proposal to divide entries into seven classifications, three prizes to be awarded in each class provided there are sufficient entries. The prizes have already been selected and will shortly be exhibited in the windows of a city store. The value of the prizes aggregates \$300.

The reports of the committees were accepted and they were instructed to carry on their work.

This afternoon's train from the east will arrive on time at 3.30.

W. H. Douglas, foreman of a large steel works at Sault Ste. Marie, has arrived in the city, being called here on account of the serious illness of his sister, Mrs. John Murray, in the Prince Rupert General Hospital.
