EDMONTON JOURNAL SAYS TIME FOR OPPOSING ROAD IS NOW PASSED

**BROAD CANADIANISM**

The Edmonton Journal, the organ of the Conservative party in northern Alberta, discussing the Hudson Bay Railway says:

On his return to Ottawa Mr. Dunning declared that he had as yet formed no opinion as to whether Nelson or Churchill should be the terminal of the Hudson Bay Railway. He is to accompany the British expert, Mr. Palmer, to those ports during the summer and every aspect of the question of which is to be selected will be thoroughly investigated.

The intimation that the minister has still an open mind on this phase of the undertaking is a welcome one. He has been subjected to a vigorous attack, led by the Manitoba Free Press, for reopening the question of the relative merits of the ports. In refusing to pay attention to this, and in proceeding with the enquiry he is taking a course in keeping with the responsibilities committed to him. His critics say that he is encouraging the opposition to the project as a whole in failing to stand by the decision that was reached some years ago to make Nelson the terminal. But there is no ground for this contention.

and the present problem is simply that of getting the best value for the outlay. Every effort should be made to assure the success of the route and its most persistent advocates ought to be the most anxious to have mistakes avoided.

It is to this end that the government has called in Mr. Palmer and, if his findings show that the railway should be built to Churchill rather than to Nelson, it would be folly not to accept them. In securing his services and in having a thorough aerial survey made of the strait; Mr. Dunning and his cabinet associates have added to instead of impairing confidence in the outcome of the enterprise. The government can no longer be accused of working in the dark.

No one who looks at the matter from the standpoint of a broad Canadianism, however doubtful he may have been of the soundness of the scheme, can have anything but the best wishes for its success. Very little of the opposition to it has been dictated by sectional narrowness, in spite of claims to the contrary. The great majority of the people of the dominion would be more than pleased if the pessimistic prophecies are shown to have been baseless and the route proves the great boon to those whom it serves that its advocates have all along been confident it would prove. But it should have every chance to realize its possibilities.

**STRAWBERRIES IN FULL SWING**

TERRACE RHUBARB PLENTIFUL AND TAKING PLACE OF APPLES—SPECULATION IN POTATO MARKET

**FEED IS STRONG**

The strawberry season is now on in full swing, first shipments of Washington berries—the Clark Seedling variety—having arrived. These are in full pint boxes and are meeting good demand at 25c per basket. Prices will be lower shortly unless the weather turns wet.

Rhubarb from Terrace is coming in plentifully now. The price is four pounds for 25c and the quality is good. This line has almost entirely displaced apples, which are out of reach and very scarce, as a dessert food.

The sugar market is firm at present prices with advances expected. Eastern markets advanced twenty per cent per hundred about ten days ago but that advance has not yet been followed by British Columbia refiners.

The old potato market is the subject of much speculation at this time, the situation having taken a complete reversal since last report. It is feared that the stocks on hand in the province today will not meet the demand until the price of the delayed crop of new potatoes is reasonable enough for ordinary demand. Consumers should protect themselves until about the middle of July. New potatoes are selling at 10c per pound straight but these are all imported stock. No word has yet been received as to when new spuds, grown in British Columbia, may be available.

Old beets are now cleaned up but new bunch beets are plentiful, the tops of which are good enough to boil. The price is two bunches for 25c.

Cabbage is scarce and very high at present. Never in the past ten years has the price soared so high. Cabbage is retailing today at 15c per pound.

The wheat market is advancing steadily and bears out predictions made in the last market report. Flour has advanced 50c per barrel in the past two weeks and may go higher any day. Feed wheat is now at \$10 per ton and the price is now \$2.25 per hundred-weight. The entire feed market is generally strong.
