

INCREASING ACCORDING TO GOV-- ERNMENT REPORT

year, there were 2,434 patients treated at the mental hospitals of British Columbia during the fiscal year of 1926, a government report shows. Of these, 1,682 were men and 752 women, the former being treated almost exclusively at Essondale and the latter at New Westminster asylum. The great majority of all the patients, 1,995, were still remaining in the hospitals at the end of the year, while fifty-seven recovered and 142 died. The increase of patients in the mental hospitals for 1926 over 1925 was 111.

The report makes a number of interesting classifications of the patients. In religious belief, of the 475 patients admitted during the year, 306 were Protestants, 76 Catholics, 39 Lutherans, fifeen Confucians and smaller numbers


