BOSTON, August 23.-Nicola Sacco and Bartolomo Venzetti e electrocuted this morning for murder. Celestino Madeiros ceded them in the electric chair by a few minutes.

Both Sacco and Vanzetti made brief speeches in the death chamber before they took their seats in the death chair, Vanzetti protesting his innocence to the last.


