

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### Price of a Garbage Can

CEVERAL months ago full civic attention was I directed at that loathsome pest in our midst, the rat. It was agreed that he was foul and dangerous, and that he must go. But there was more talk than action and so the rat in all his thousands is still with us, as undesirable and prolific as ever.

As winter closes in, his unwanted presence becomes more obvious. Taking advantage of the city's tolerance, he invades private homes, offices and public buildings and makes himself comfortable and reproductive in the heat which we provide.

It is disgraceful and dangerous enough that the populace should be forced to house this verminous guest, but why it should also deliberately feed him is a question that has no answer. Yet this is what residents by the score are doing.

In most cities it has become compulsory that garbage should be put outside in a metal lidded container. Not only does this afford protection from pests before the garbage is picked up, but it facilitates handling into the disposal trucks.

In Prince Rupert no such precaution is enforced, with the result that waste food in cardboard boxes and paper bundles liberally adorns the streets on, and before, collection day. This is blue-plate service for rats, and they often get a second go at it when the boxes or bundles tear and the contents are scattered into the street. Sea-gulls and dogs are helpful accomplices in spreading the debris.

It is understandable that some families should regard the cost of a suitable garbage can as a real problem. Yet if these families are inviting rats to their doorsteps, they are also inviting them into their homes where their depredations will eventually prove far more costly than the price of a garbage can.

This and all the other attractions offered to the rats of Prince Rupert should come under serious official scrutiny and it should be soon, because the creatures meanwhile are going about their vital business of breeding, ravaging, and threatening the health of the city.

We cannot expect any Pied Piper miracles, but anything would be better than inaction.

## Weatherman Wants to Help

A LTHOUGH people everywhere have a lot of I fun at the weatherman's expense, there are few individuals in positions of public responsibility who are listened to with more interest.

The fact is that the weatherman today is not the befuddled, inept character that we like to picture. His trade has become a highly professional one in which reports are received from thousands of miles away so that each community may know what to expect not only tomorrow but several days hence.

Those whose lives may depend on his word, such as fishermen and aircraft pilots, have learned to put their faith in him. Yet as the meteorologist, as he is now called, is usually giving his information to an unseen audience by wireless, it is not always possible for him to tell if his service is meeting requirements. This applies particularly to shipping operators who rely wholly on the radio to receive their weather reports.

To correct this, the meteorological office at Sea Island, Vancouver, is circulating a request for opinions and advice as to how the service can be improved.

Addressed to coastal shipping companies, operators of towboats and fishing vessels, government and other patrol craft, its enquiry includes such questions as these: What parts of the B.C. coast produce particular weather problems for your operations? What kind of information is more important to you: forecasts and warnings of expected weather, or local reports of observed conditions? What improvements would you like to see?

There may be some operators who have not received this questionnaire but who have problems which they wish to offer for consideration. If so, they are asked to write to this address: Marine Weather Broadcasts, Meteorological Office, Vancouver AMF, B.C.

Results may be gained from this enquiry which will assist many in coping with the forces of weather. It is hoped that full use will be made of it.

The reason is that the newsprint industry is classified as essentially an export enterprise since only a minor fraction of its output goes into the domestic market. Because of that fact it evades the provisions of the anti-combines legislation.



Everyone knows money talks.


