(Where a husband and wife each have a separate income, an aggregate rebate on \$1,800, shall be apportioned between them). . . \$1,800.00 Single persons, and widows and widowers without dependent children \$1,200.00 Cach dependent nsurance Premiums paid but not exceeding \$500.00 Non-resident persons (only) \$1,000.00 Assessors will make the necessary corrections on returns where rebates, as revised, have not been claimed. An individual whose income does not exceed \$900.00 is

ot required to file a return except upon demand of the ASSESSOT. Returns should be made promptly in order to avoid incur-

ing penalties. The necessary forms and full information may be obtained upon application to any Provincial Assessor or to the Commissioner of Income Tax, Victoria.


