AWFUL CRIME

MAN ATTEMPTED TO KILL WIFE AND DAUGHTER AND THEN TOOK OWN LIFE

LLOYDMINSTER, June 8.-Liquor is held by investigating officers to have been indirectly responsible for the attempted murder of Mrs. G. W. Miller, and the suicide of Guy W. Miller, her husband, which shocked the town here.

Miller, who had resided in Lloydminster for 20 years, had been left a prosperous business by his parents, but years Miller had secured various positions in out-of-town places, but had invariably returned to his wife and family, who conducted a well-paying millinery store in the town.

Last week Mrs. Miller gave her husband \$40 to go away with, to search for work, but in Vermilion this "stake" also disappeared and it is believed this fact precipitated the fatal quarrel. Miller used a 3-inch bladed jack-knife

to commit his act. According to Constable Farthing of the Lloydminster detachement of the A.P.P., Miller fought the officers when they found him sitting on the side of his bed with blood dripping from an open wound in his throat. All attempts to bandage the wound and staunch the flow of blood proved unavailing when Miller tore the sheeting away and exclaimed "Get out of here and leave me alone and let me die."

HEARST NEWSPAPER TAKES EXCEPTION TO IRRITATING CANADA

NEW YORK, June 8 .- Under the caption "Not Worth the Risk of Irritation," William Randolph Hearst's New York American, in an editorial dealing with the United States border immigration ruling affecting Canadians, says "that they do not seem essential to a winnowing of undesirable immigration."

After stating that the international border is the world's longest stretch of unbroken peace, and that next to the United Kingdom, Canada is the United States' best customer, the American says: "Business joins sentiment in decreeing that the mutual cordiality these kindred peoples shall not be endangered by irritations which goodwill can allay."

"A policy of the United States towards immigration has produced a law which unless modified, may dot the historically. peaceful border with irritations," the newspaper says.

"Natives of Canada crossing that border daily to and from work, have hitherto been unmolested. They are to be required to pay a passport fee and a head tax. Persons living in Canada but not natives will be admitted even transiently only within the quotas of countries their birth. . . . Should Canada retaliate, as well she might, the proud strip peace could harly fail to become a running sore."
