ONE INDIAN DEAD AND ANOTHER GOES TO PEN IN LIQUOR THEFT

Harry Ridley with Companion Stole Bottle of Rum with Fatal Results

Harry Ridley, Indian, who figured in a recent episode on the Island reserve at Massett when Eddie Edwards, another native, drank himself to death, was brought to the city on the Prince John yesterday afternoon by Indian Agent James Gillett and taken on last night to New Westminster penitentiary where he will serve two years for theft. It appears that the dead man and Ridley stole a bottle of rum from the premises of a white man, Edwards, who was only twenty years old, imbibed heavily and was taken to his shack in a stupor about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. When he was next looked at about 9 o'clock the next morning he was dead. An inquest was held and the arrest of Ridley followed. He was charged with theft and was sent down for two years by Stipendiary Magistrate A. R. Mallory of Port Clements.

Ridley was taken aboard the steamer Prince Rupert last night to New Westminster by Corporal R. P. Ponder who also had in his custody Joona Hulthen of Haysport, who will do three months at Okalla for vagrancy.
