STEAMERS COLLIDE CAPE FLATTERY

EGYPT OBJECTS TO BRITISH WARSHIPS BEING SENT THERE

Collision This Morning Between Two Steamers Just Off Cape Flattery

VICTORIA, June 3.—A wireless message reports a collision took place shortly after ten o'clock this morning between two steamers off Cape Flattery. The steamer Suremico and Arkansas came together with severe damage to the Arkansas which sent out immediate wireless calls for assistance.

Aid to the vessels is being sent as rapidly as possible. The steamers are between eighty and ninety miles from here.

CRUCIAL TIME ALBERTA POOL

CAMPAIGN FOR RESIGNING OF FIVE
YEAR AGREEMENTS IN BEING
LAUNCHED ON MONDAY

EDMONTON, July 3.—The five year contracts signed by members of the pool are near expiring and a drive is being made throughout the province for the signing of new agreements. An effort is to be made not only to have the old members sign up for another period but also to get a number of those who have not yet thrown in their lot with the pool. Practically all the public men in the province are using their influence in favor of the movement. A conference is to be held at Calgary on Monday and on Wednesday at the same place a co-operative rally is to be held which will be addressed by the premiers of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. The federal members for Alberta are asked to take part and also members of the provincial legislature and presidents of community clubs and farmers organizations.

A systematic canvass is to be made and the radio will be used as an adjunct.

SALMON PRICES LOW KETCHIKAN

FISHERMEN QUIT WORK BECAUSE
NOT SATISFIED WITH OFFERS
OF BUYERS

KETCHIKAN, June 3.—Dissatisfied with the prices offered by Ketchikan buyers, the salmon trollers off Baranoff Island district ceased fishing. Opening prices for Reds and Kings over sixteen pounds were 16 cents. Reds between four and sixteen pounds, 8c; whites, 4c.

Buyers refused to make any increase on the ground that lower prices on Puget Sound this year made competition difficult.

RUSSIANS LEFT ENGLAND TODAY

OFFICIAL REPRESENTATIVES OF
SOVIET GIVEN SEND-OFF BY
BRITISH COMMUNISTS

LONDON, June 3.—The main body of Soviet representatives in England, whose functions terminated by the recent suspension of diplomatic relations between Great Britain and Soviet Russia, left for home this morning to the accompaniment of Communist demonstrations by a moderate sized crowd on the station platform. Commemorative songs were sung and red flags waved. Also there were some boos for the Russians.

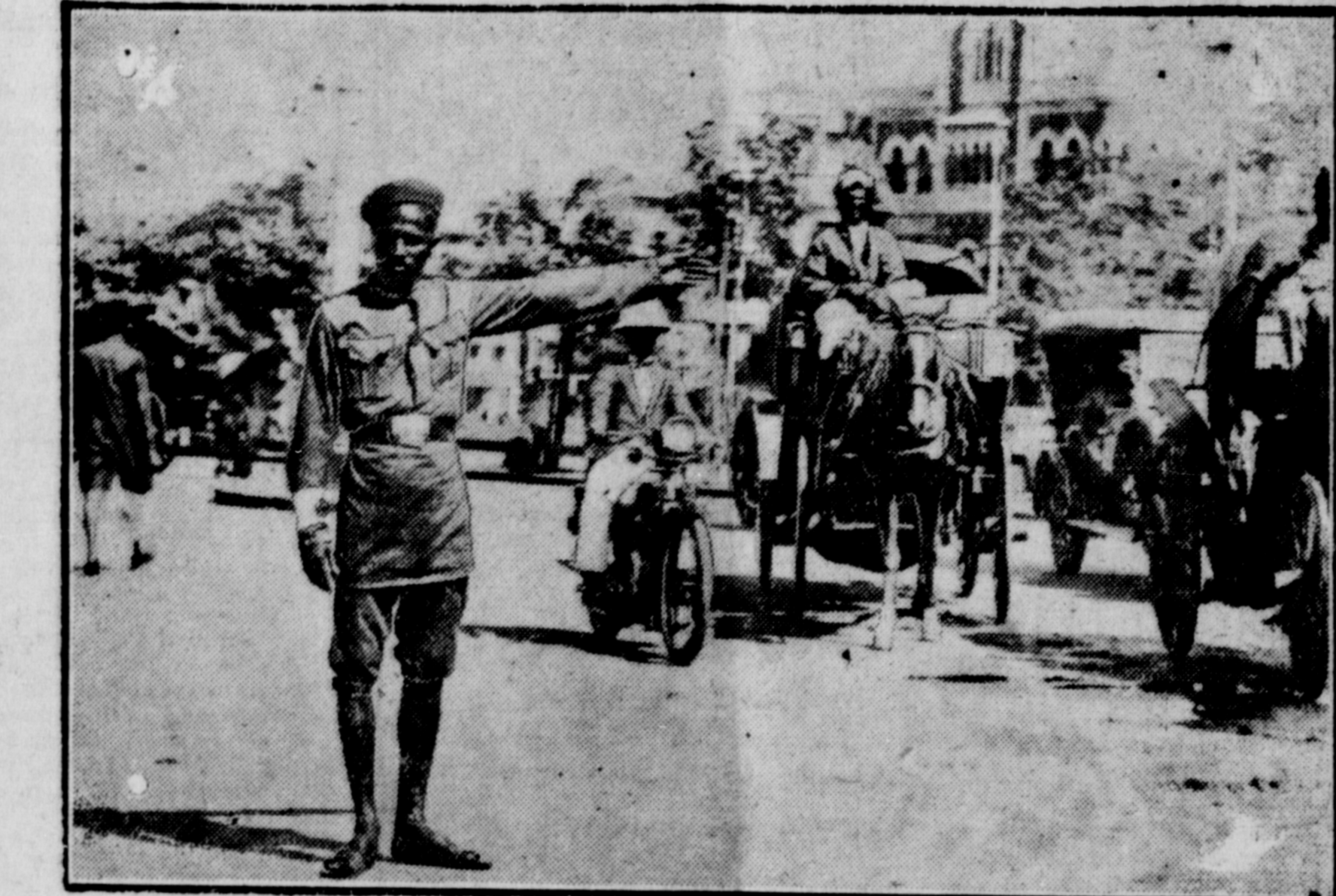
EXTRADITION ORDER FOR HENRY SERETH

LEADING TEAMS WON YESTERDAY

NEW CHANGES IN BIG LEAGUE
STANDINGS AS RESULT OF GAMES
PLAYED THURSDAY

NEW YORK, June 3.—It was first division teams' day in the Big Leagues Thursday. In the National League, the leading Pittsburgh Pirates turned the tables on Philadelphia for the loss the day previous and won 7 to 3. The New York Giants defeated Cincinnati Reds and rose to third place in the standing. In the American League, all first division teams won over their opponents in the second class, there being no changes in the standing.

Three defeats marked the first charge of the American League west against the eastern baseball front as invaders, "Dutch" Reuther took back a sadly disorganized club with only two hits, the Yankees scored an 8 to 4 victory over Cleveland and every Washington player got at least one hit to rout St. Louis Browns. The White Sox alone of the invaders won, Chicago taking its ninth victory from Boston.

In the National League, the Cincinnati Reds gave the Giants a jolt before the latter pulled through with a 5-4 triumph. The Pittsburgh Pirates, continuing their momentum, flattened Philadelphia 7-3.

Muskrat Raising on Islands Is Well Established Declares Owner of Farm Near Massett

A. D. Hallett, who lived for some years at Alice Arm where he was engaged in prospecting and who went to Massett a couple of years ago with a view to engaging in cranberry farming which project was found to be impracticable on account of winter frosts, is now pioneering the raising of muskrats there and has hopes of developing it into a large industry.

About February 15 Mr. Hallett obtained sixteen rats from near Edmonton and these have thrived well, increasing now to 100. Conditions for feeding, etc., Mr. Hallett says, are very favorable, and he anticipates being able to produce about 5,000 yearly for the fur market in about two years. In the meantime, he does not intend to part with any of his flock of little animals. In preparation for their raising, Mr. Hallett has expended some \$80,000 on a quarter section of land he holds there.

Mr. Hallett arrived in the city from Massett on the Prince John yesterday and plans spending about a week in the city. His brother, Frank Hallett, is a patient in the local hospital suffering from a fracture of the skull sustained in an accident at a logging camp at Gardner Canal which he conducts.

VANCOUVER, June 3.—Hanging from a telegraph pole the body of a man believed to be William Vanwell Carpenter, was found in the Grandview district this morning.

NO PROSECUTION OF SAMMY MANDELL FOR DEATH OF ADAMS

KANSAS CITY, June 3.—There will be no prosecution of Sammy Mandell, lightweight champion boxer, in connection with the death from a broken neck of his opponent Steve Adams of Chicago, as the authorities are convinced that death was accidental, it is announced.

MOVIE ACTRESS WAS FATALLY INJURED

LOS ANGELES, June 3.—Evelyn Egan, 20 years of age, a motion picture actress, was fatally injured when she drove a motor car into a steam shovel on Hollywood boulevard. Her head was crushed and physicians had to remove one eye. The auto was demolished.

Egypt's Premier Declares the Despatch of Warships to That Country Unwarranted by Facts

CAIRO, June 3.—Premier Sawat Pasha, addressing the chamber of deputies here today declared that the despatch of British warships to Egypt was unwarranted as there was no movement in the country threatening the lives or interests of foreigners. He said: "Peace and security reign everywhere. Foreigners themselves are quite tranquil and there is great hope that this conflict may end, thanks to the spirit of friendship governing the Anglo-Egyptian relations, in a manner securing Egypt's interests with honor."
