ABOLISHING CLOSE SEASON ON HALIBUT.

The suggestion made at Ketchikan that the closed season for quarters to keep up the fight. halibut be abolished and that, in its place as a conservation measure. certain areas be closed to fishing is an interesting one which appears to contain some virtue. The need of conservation is admitted but, pressed in letters, agricultural members at the same time, it is felt that the halibut fishermen, with their large investments in boats, etc., should be allowed continuous employment. On the other hand, it is doubtful if the suggested scheme would be as effective in the matter of conservation as the closed season. It is a question that will need a good deal of careful consideration.

STRONG HOLD OF HOME TALENT PLAYS

Find a town in any of these nine provinces and there you will find in the course of any year and every year a home-talent play, or several of them. They are institutions as firmly established as the schools, churches and lodges which turn to them for needed revenue. Since time immemorial these theatrical productions have been just plain "home-talent plays" in the small town and little red schoolhouse, but under such imposing designations as "Civic Opera," "Little Theatre" and "Community Players" they have taken on new dignity in the city.

In the preparation for a home-talent play the first requisite is the selection of the play. Tragedy entrusted to amateurs would be truly tragic. And home-talent has no more talent for drama. It must be comedy. But it must be of a most decorous sort. Too much love-making, means too much gossip and scandal. And whatever the number of acts it must be in one scene. If a change of scenery is essential, it must be accomplished by shifting the furniture.

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 26 .__ (By Canadian Press) .- The farm relief controversy has not been ended by the action of President Coolidge in vetoing the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill Agricultural leaders in Congress and farm leaders who have championed the bill who are not in Congress declare the fight has only begun, and there are many indicating they are correct.
