FEATURES OF WORK

Some of Materials Used In Power Construction—Also Some Figures

Following are some interesting features and figures in connection with the Falls River hydro-electric development:

The dam is of solid concrete, designed as a gravity section. Flood discharge is provided for by a spillway 187 feet long and two sluiceways 20 by 20 feet each. Placing of concrete commenced May 2, 1930, 90% completed by July 31. This work was carried out behind two log-crib, rock-filled cofferdams, diverting the river first to the south bank, and then through the two sluiceway openings. An opening 16 feet wide is provided for a log sluice. The penstock is a riveted steel pipe six feet in diameter and 765 feet long.

The powerhouse is a reinforced concrete structure, the foundations of which extend to a depth of 24 feet below normal tailwater level.

Transmission Line Is Long

Skeena River Span One of Longest Over Water Power Crossings In World

The Falls River-Prince Rupert transmission line is 45 miles long and connects the plant to the city of Prince Rupert, where it will be distributed for civic and industrial purposes. The Skeena River is crossed by five spans, a distance of 7868 feet from anchor tower to anchor tower (longest span 2100 feet) classifying this as one of the longest over water crossings in the world. These spans are supported by steel towers rising 790 feet above water level. The balance of the line is carried on single and two-pole structures.
