WINNIPEG, Sept. 19 .- Agreements covering the land settlement of a large number of British families during the next two or three years, have been completed as a result of recent negotiations between Lord Lovatt, representing the British government, and W. J. Black, director of colonization for the Canadian National Railways. Lord Lovatt is stated to be well satisfied with the farm-British families in Canada, and impressed with the effective colonization machinery available for the handling of such settlement. The present movement of British settlers through the colonization department of the National Railways will be made effective in
