Jimmy McLarnin of Vancouver Fails in Effort to Secure the Lightweight Championship Title

Beaten on Points at New York Last Night in Fifteen Round Fistic Battle With Sammy Mandell

NEW YORK, May 22.—Though he carried the fight to his op-ponent much of the way and put up the battle of his life, Irish Jimmy McLarnin of Vancouver was unsuccessful in his campaign last night for the world's lightweight boxing crown against Sammy Mandell, the champion. Mandell fairly retained his title and had a wide margin of points in the fifteen round contest at the Polo Grounds. There was an assemblage of 25,000 fans present who maintained enthusiasm throughout the battle and greeted the obvious decision with yells of approval although there were a few

cat calls. Both fighters entered the ring .-fit and imbued with confidence. At the ringside, the betting was about even for Boll Robert money.
