

DR. KING AND LIQUOR EXPORT

Member of Federal Government Says He Does Not Understand Mr. Pooley

VANCOUVER, Oct. 13.—That he could not understand the attitude of Attorney General Pooley in his attack on Hon. W. D. Euler, was the statement made Thursday by Hon. Dr. J. H. King on his arrival here. He said Hon. Mr. Euler was only following the practice of the Dominion Government in consulting the Provincial Government as to its wishes in such matters.

Dr. King said he did not know whether he could be on the coast for the Victoria by-election.

WEEKLY SAILINGS HALIFAX LIVERPOOL

WINNIPEG, Oct. 13.—An announcement was made at Canadian National Railways headquarters today that after several months of negotiations arrangements have been consummated by Sir Henry Thornton, chairman and president of the C.N.R. with the management of the White Star and Cunard steamship lines in London, whereby there will be weekly east bound freight and passenger sailings from Halifax direct to Liverpool and Halifax direct to London. This announcement is the result of negotiations to make possible a more complete freight and passenger communication between parts of Canada and those two ports in the British Isles by way of Halifax.

CONSERVATIVES WIN TAVISTOCK ELECTION

Tavistock, Oct. 13.—The Conservatives retained the Tavistock division of Devonshire, Briggen Wallace Duffield, V. C. winning over the Liberal, Lieut. Commander R. T. Fletcher, R.N. by a small majority of 173. The Labor candidate was far behind.

FORMER MANAGER OF CANADA STEAMSHIPS DIED AT VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Oct. 13.—Harry W. Cowan, former manager of the Canada Steamship lines of Montreal is dead here. He came to Vancouver two years ago and was manager of the Alberta Pacific Pier Corporation.

LOST IN FAR HUDSON'S BAY

Vessel Wrecked and One Man Dies From Exposure While Another Seriously Ill

OTTAWA, Oct. 13.—Headquarters of the Mounted Police received a wireless from Sergeant Major Joyce at Chesterfield Inlet that one member of the party of the Northern Aerial Minerals Exploration party died and another is lying seriously ill, as a result of freezing and wandering some days in the northern wilds.

The report states that Joe Rutherford died near the headquarters of the Princess River on September 24 and a companion, Thomas P. Cowan came into Chesterfield Inlet five days later in an exhausted condition.

Schooner Patrick and Michael attached to the expedition stranded on a reef.

Rutherford apparently died of heart failure.

Although details are lacking it is presumed that following the wreck of the schooner the crew split into two parties and Cowan and Rutherford got lost. Five survivors will remain at Baker Lake for the winter. Rutherford's body was not recovered.

IRISH NAMES IN THE ARCTIC

When the Effie E. Morrissey was in the Arctic the party stopped at an Eskimo village to pick up a couple of men to help them with their walrus hunting. They found that quite a number of the hunters had Irish names. This is accounted for by the fact that in the early days the whalers picked up men for the hunting, and, not knowing the proper names called one Murphy, another O'Reilly and another some other common Irish name. These names they kept and today are very proud of them.

WOULD CURTAIL ORIENTAL SHOPS

VANCOUVER, Oct. 13.—Curtailling of the Oriental shops is stated by W. H. Malkin to be one plank of his platform in the present mayoralty contest. "Oriental shops should not be scattered throughout the city. They should be concentrated in one central quarter," he said.

C.P.R. STEAMSHIPS FORMER OFFICIAL DIES

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—William Thomas Payne, 77 years of age one of the earliest links in the Canadian Pacific Oriental service, died here yesterday. He retired in 1922 when manager of the Trans-Pacific Steamships at Yokohama.


