LONDON, Dec. 10.—The Leagu of Nations union heard two versions of "The next war," both startling predictions of what might happen.

Lord Hailsbury, in a speech said that the "next war" would commence where the last one left

"It would be years ahead," he said, "with the result that new poison gas might wipe out the opulation of London in 12 hours. Every human in that area might be killed. 
