### WASHINGTON IN LIMELIGHT NOW

TOOK TWO GAMES YESTERDAY FROM INDIANS WITH WHOM THEY ARE TIED FOR FOURTH PLACE IN AMERICAN

NEW YORK, July 11. — Washington Senators climbed into fourth place in the American League yesterday alongside the Cleveland Indians whom they routed in two games of a double-header. St. Louis Browns got to the 500 mark by winning over Boston. In the National League, the St. Louis Cardinals further improved their hold on first place by vanquishing the running-up New York Giants 5 to 1. Cincinnati Reds, by winning over Brooklyn 12-4 in a loose game, went ahead of the Giants in games won and lost thought not in average points. The fourth place Chicago Cubs consolidated their position by winning a close game from Boston and the Pittsburgh Pirates showed signs of renewed strength by beating the lowly Phillies in another close match.

### Around The World With Sport Fans

(By The Train)

Tomorrow is the date set for an exhibition lacrosse game between New Westminster's Olympic team and the best bunch of players Edmonton can select.

The Manitoba Free Press remarks that although the people of Manitoba are more than pleased that Jimmy Ball and Brant Little were successful in making a place on the Canadian Olympic team there has been great disappointment expressed in many quarters that young Billy Kibblewhite, who captured the 5,000 metres event at the trials was not also included. It is felt that his brilliant performance in the gruelling race merited more consideration than his performance received from the selection committee. Without mentioning any names we are inclined to think that there are one or two hardily attained the standard that Kibblewhite made and were selected to go.

Tex Rickard insists that the Tunney-Heeny scrap will go on quite as scheduled. Ordinarily so much "smooch" is disseminated about these heavy battles that the bland Texan just sits back and awaits his huge profits. Folks refuse to get excited about the "titular" scrap, so Rickard comes to the front with some observations about the forthcoming mill. He declares that the New Zealander is the logical contender, and has more than an outside chance to win. The fans will recall how everybody grinned when Rickard said Tunney would beat Dempsey. Heeny is a "tough bird." Risko, Sharkey and Delaney socked him until they were tired and he came in for more. It is doubtful if Tunney can hit him any more than that trio did. The champion is likely to stand off and outbox him as he out-boxed Dempsey.

Following representations made by T. A. Murphy, M.L.A., Toronto and chairman of the Ontario Athletic Commission, the Ontario government by order in council Wednesday, made an additional grant of \$5,000 towards the expenses of sending Ontario athletes to the Olympic games. This brings the total contribution of the Ontario government to 10,000.

### SPORT CHAT

While the New York Giants, Cincinnati Reds, Brooklyn Dodgers and Chicago Cubs battle for place, St. Louis Cardinals hold a steady lead in the National League and are almost looking good enough for another flag although they have anything but clinched things yet. With the failure of the Pittsburgh Pirates to play consistently and Boston and Philadelphia practically out of the race, the Cards, Giants, Reds, Cubs and Dodgers have yet a lot to settle between them before the contest is any way nearer a definite settlement. The Reds have been showing renewed strength of late and may start some fireworks again. While the gap has been lessened a little, the supremacy of the Yankees in the American League still seems to be much of a cinch. About all the Athletics, indomitable as they may be, can hope for will be to hold second place though, of course, if something sensational happened, they might yet assume to the top. But that would be a very improbable happening. It is a peculiar enough situation that only two teams in the American League so far this season have won more games than they have lost.

### FIRE DAMAGES

#### POWERBOAT 23

INVESTIGATION OF GAS LEAK WITH OPEN FLAME ATTENDED WITH DISASTROUS RESULT YESTERDAY

The well known local harbor boat "23" sustained damage roughly estimated at \$800 and the owner, Henry Darby, was fortunate indeed to escape with only burns around the face and hands as a result of a fire which broke out aboard the vessel about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon as she was moored at the dry dock. Mr. Darby had perceived the odor as of leaking gas and, lifting a plank over the bilge, he lit a match to investigate. Fire followed immediately and soon the boat was a mass of flames and dense smoke which lifted into the air.

Fortunately, workmen at the dry dock were on hand and soon streams of water were playing from hoses into the boat. The fire department answered promptly to the call but the blaze was about out by the time the firemen arrived.

One boat, the Metra, which was nearby, moved away and the "23" was pulled from the vicinity of the F. H. Phippen.

Only prompt work saved the tanks on the "23" from blowing up with much more serious damage. Mr. Darby was also fortunate to escape with but minor injuries. The damage to the boat included charring of inside woodwork and bulkheads and the burning out of the wiring and ignition. There was no insurance on the boat.
