(Special to Daily News) NEW YORK, May 28 .- The leading Cincinnati Reds settled the National League pennant hopes of the St. Louis Cardinals for the time being at least with two straight victories over the week-end. The Chicago Cubs won twice over the Pittsburg Pirates and are still dogging the Reds for first place, but one game behind. New York Giants, who captured a doubleheader from the Phillies yesterday, are riding in third place with Brooklyn Robins and St. Louis Cardinals following in order.

In the American League, the Philadelphia Athletics lost their fourth straight game to the leading New York Yankees on Saturday and, in the switch-over yesterday, were beaten again by the Washington Senators. Cleveland Indians are now threatening the Mackmen's for second place.


