It has been announced that D. G. A. Lowe, the famous Cambridge University athlete and Olympic champion, has decided to retire from the track. Lowe's most recent individual successes were at the Olympic games when he became the 880-metre champion and record holder in 1 min. 51 4-5 seconds and in Berlin shortly afterwards, when he beat his old rival Dr. Otto Peltzer of Germany, at the same distance in 1 min. 51 1-5 seconds. The world's record for the distance is that of 1 minute 50 3-5 seconds, made by Seraphin Martin in the French championships at Colombes a fortnight before the Olympic Games. Lowe proposes to devote himself to his career as a barrister but will continue to interest himself in the legislative side of athletics.

Harold Wright, now attending the University of Alberta, at Edmonton, has had a phenomenal rise. Three summers ago he was merely a promising collegiate stepper. Last year after winning inter-collegiate honors in Saskatoon, he began to attract considerable notice around town and earned the right to take a 'big' at the Canadian championships in Toronto. Unplaced, he resumed training with an eye to making the Olympic team this year. Wright's showing in the trials in Hamilton was a gallant one; he gave Percy Williams a stern argument in the 200 metres, on his heat in the 400 metres and only failed to make the grade in the later tests because of his extreme youth.

## Giants Beaten In First Game Yesterday By Pitching of Art Nehf One Time on Their Team

NEW YORK, September 28.—If John McGraw is nosed out of the National pennant, as seems likely, he can blame a good part of it on the players who once wore Giant uniforms. Art Nehf, once the left-handed prince of McGraw, dealt his one time boss a staggering blow yesterday when he twirled Chicago to victory in the opening clash of a double header.

The Giants came back with a victory but the easy win by St. Louis over Boston carried them a full game ahead of New York.

Only three games remain on the schedule and the one-game lead may well stand until the two contenders clash in the final battle at the polo grounds Sunday.

In yesterday's game Nehf held his former team mates to six hits while the Cubs were touching Karl Hubbell for nine, giving a three to two margin lead.

In the second game the Giants got only three hits off Charlie Root and Percy Jones but one of them was Frank Hogan's homer in the second and other was a single in the fourth by Lindstrom, who eventually scored on Heman's sacrifice fly.

Joe Genewich gave the Cubs only five hits and was never in less danger. Jess Haines pitched the Cardinals to an easy victory over the Braves. The Red Birds got six runs in the first innings.
