## STUDENTS OF HIGH SCHOOL

Edmonton Teachers Want Right to Refuse Admission to Non-Workers

EDMONTON, Sept. 28.—With some high school teachers reporting that they are utterly discouraged with the attitude on the part of some students in regard to their class work, the Edmonton High School Teachers' Alliance Tuesday night took the first step to change the situation by asking that the Edmonton Public School board establish the following regulation: "That the principal of each high school in conference with his staff, may refuse registration to, suspend, or expel any student whose academic record is such as to indicate that he is not giving serious attention to his work."

The question will be referred to the conference committee of the board which will meet representatives from the Alliance and the matter discussed.

The attitude of some students has been the subject of bitter complaint by teachers for many years, and the Alliance want some power to weed out students who do not care for their work and who failed to extend any efforts in their class rooms.

## C.P.R. BOUND FOR THE COAST

Winnipeg Thinks They Will Go South to Ashcroft Perhaps by P. G. E.

A Winnipeg despatch to the Edmonton Journal has the following: "The construction of an outlet to the Pacific coast is brought within the sphere of practical perhaps immediate action."

This is the significant paragraph of a two-column editorial in today's Free Press, entitled "Opening up an Empire."

The Free Press analysis of what the acquisition by the C. P. R. of the Alberta government railways means, reflects what is being talked of generally in financial and transportation circles—an immediate outlet to the coast. While the Free Press intimates that they may be acquired through connection at Prince George with the Pacific and Great Eastern or by "building through a new line in one of the three passes—the Peace, the Pine, or the Wapiti—to a connection with the main line of the C.P.R. or down the Skeena or perhaps through the B.C. parklands to Stewart and the development of a third great seaport on the Pacific coast."

### Other Possibilities

But other comment in financial circles suggests that the extension of the C.P.R. if it does not acquire the P. & G. E. is almost certain to be down the old Caribou trail to a junction at Ashcroft.

In any event this comment suggests that the C.P.R. will continue to centre its operations on the coast in the Vancouver port, where it is the dominating transportation interest by sea and land. It is no secret, however, that the C.P.R. management has for some time had its experts carefully surveying the P. & G. E. line and its adjacent territory. One of the C.P.R. right-of-way experts spent nearly the whole summer there and traveled on both sides of the line to remote points as far as 150 miles. So it is said when the company finally concluded to pay a very large sum for the Alberta railways, it had a plan already worked out that either contemplates the acquisition of the P. & G. E. or the extension west and south from Grande Prairie to the main line and into Vancouver.

Certain it is that eastern financial and transportation interests expect an immediate announcement of a coast extension of the Alberta system.

## DEVELOPMENT OF INSURANCE

J. P. Doherty of Vancouver Addresses Rotary Club on Interesting Subject

While insurance companies have failed in Canada, policy holders have never lost a cent. That was the reassuring statement made by J. P. Doherty, superintendent of insurance for the province of British Columbia, when addressing the Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday, S. D. Johnston presiding.

Mr. Doherty explained that when a company showed weakness there was always another concern ready to take it over and pay the obligations.

In his department, the speaker said, the protection of the public was their first concern. They were the buffer between the companies and the people.

Mr. Doherty outlined the growth of insurance. At the time of confederation there was only one Canadian company, the British-American of Toronto. No mention was made of insurance in the British North America Act of 1867. The next year, however, a law was passed providing for the licensing of companies. Deposits were provided as a protection to the insured.

One important work of the superintendents was to secure uniform regulations throughout Canada. They already had them for the four western provinces and Ontario but Quebec had not yet come in. The French Canadians adhered to the old French laws.

At the conclusion Mr. Doherty was thanked for his address by the chairman.

## INSURANCE AGENTS HOLD A CONFERENCE WITH SUPERINTENDENT

Local insurance agents had a meeting yesterday afternoon with J. P. Doherty, superintendent of insurance for the provincial government.
