Large Gain Within Past Year Of Users Of Rupert Public Utilities Indicates Increase In Population

Statistics obtained at the City Hall shown steady increase in uses of electric light and powef, water and telephones this year over last, indicating a healthy if not spectacular gradual rise in the population of Prince Rupert.

There are a total of 1950 consumers of electric light and power today as compared with 1834 at the corresponding time last year.. Commercial consumers have increased in the twelvemonth from 503 to 520 while the increase of residential consumers is more notable from 1174 to 1331.

The water department announces 1550 actual main service connections, serving an estimated 2,050 consumers, as compared, with 1518 connections last year.

There are slightly over 1610 telephone instruments in use today as compared with 1570 at a similar date last year.
