## CHARMING VOICE

For three-quarters of an hour the charming voice spoke on. Whatever its merits, one thing is clear. Mr. Amery is convinced of the soundness, of the reasonableness, of the splendor, of his imperial theory. He is fired by the traditions of the great heritage of Empire which the heroes and worthies of England since the time of Elizabeth's sea dogs have won for England; its flavor lies like wine upon his tengue and whets its eloquence and mellows his speech.
