

The work of converting the power plant at Duthie mine from steam to electricity and improvement of conditions at the property generally has been proceeding at a rapid pace and, very shortly, a model camp should be the result. Boilers have been installed in the new powerhouse in the vicinity of Loon Lake and the installation of a 500 k.w. generator for supplying the property with electric light and power has commenced. A pole line has been erected to connect the power house and the mill and camp site, a distance of about half a mile. The capacity of the mill is increased from 75 to 100 tons daily with the installation of the additional machinery. Boarding and bunk houses to accomodate 100 men are in course of construction. There is also a new office building and foreman's residence. A big new strike was recently made in Duthie, the tunnel proving ore to be without a break for 250 feet and depth
