

Coronation Committee Change Mind About TV

(Reuters)—Officials of the Coronation next week have bowed to a public and approved television broadcast of the event.

The committee announced TV cameras would be allowed into Westminster Abbey to cover the lengthy religious ceremony, including the actual placing of the crown on the queen's head.

Parts of the rites will be banned, however. Viewers will not see the queen's brow and palm anointed with the sacred oil. Nor will they see her take communion.

A first announcement last month banned TV cameras from recording any of the rites inside the Abbey except the formal procession down the aisle. Newspapers and many politicians joined in a public outcry and the matter was taken up by the cabinet.

The Coronation committee also announced the procession through the streets of London will be extended so more people can watch.

CBC Wins Praise of P-TA At Conrad Street School

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation got a boost locally when members of the Conrad Street School Parent-Teacher Association at the monthly meeting commended the CBC for "the way in which it has realized and carried out its social and cultural responsibilities to the people of Canada, particularly the young people."

The action was taken "in view of the many recent attacks on the CBC."

The commendation asks for endorsement by other city P-TAs. The P-T Council will be asked to press for repair or removal of the wooden foot bridge on Immanuel Street near Seal Cove School.

Members said that although a sign on the bridge reads, "use at your own risk," children seldom stop to read signs and many cross the bridge daily.

"This is a definite risk to their safety, since the bridge is in de-

plorable condition," says the resolution.

T. G. Bateman, principal at Conrad Street School, was delegated as safety representative to expedite order of luminous tape for use as reflectors for bikes of school children.

An action committee to investigate establishing a scholarship to aid one student in teacher training was appointed, consisting of W. D. Griffiths, Mr. Bateman, Mr. Robertson, Mrs. Harold Thomas and Mrs. John Denning. Mrs. E. W. Becker, retiring trustee of the school board, spoke briefly supporting the school by-law and commended the group for its lively meetings.

Pennant and prize money for most parents attending meetings were won by the grade 4-5 class for the second time.
