LARGER OUTPUT OF MINERALS

COMPLETE REPORT OF MINISTER OF MINES JUST ISSUED INDICATES INCREASED ACTIVITY

VICTORIA, June 9.—Increased activity and a larger output of minerals were the distinguishing feature of the mining industry in British Columbia during 1927. While the gross value of the production was less than that of the previous year, the actual tonnage of ore mined showed a substantial increase indicating the greater development over 1926.

The gross value of the output of the mines of the Province was \$60,729,358 as compared with \$67,188,842 in 1926, a decrease of \$6,459,484, or 9.6 per cent, a decrease accounted for not by any slackening in production but because of lowered metal prices. In fact the actual quantity produced was 5,418,021 tons of ore mined or 640,948 tons in excess of the previous twelve months.

These figures are set forth in the annual report of the Minister of Mines, Hon. W. H. Sutherland, which has just been issued and the final revised figures for 1927 as compiled by John D. Galloway, provincial mineralogist. They indicate that while the lowered metal prices might be expected to reduce profits and dividends, yet the increased

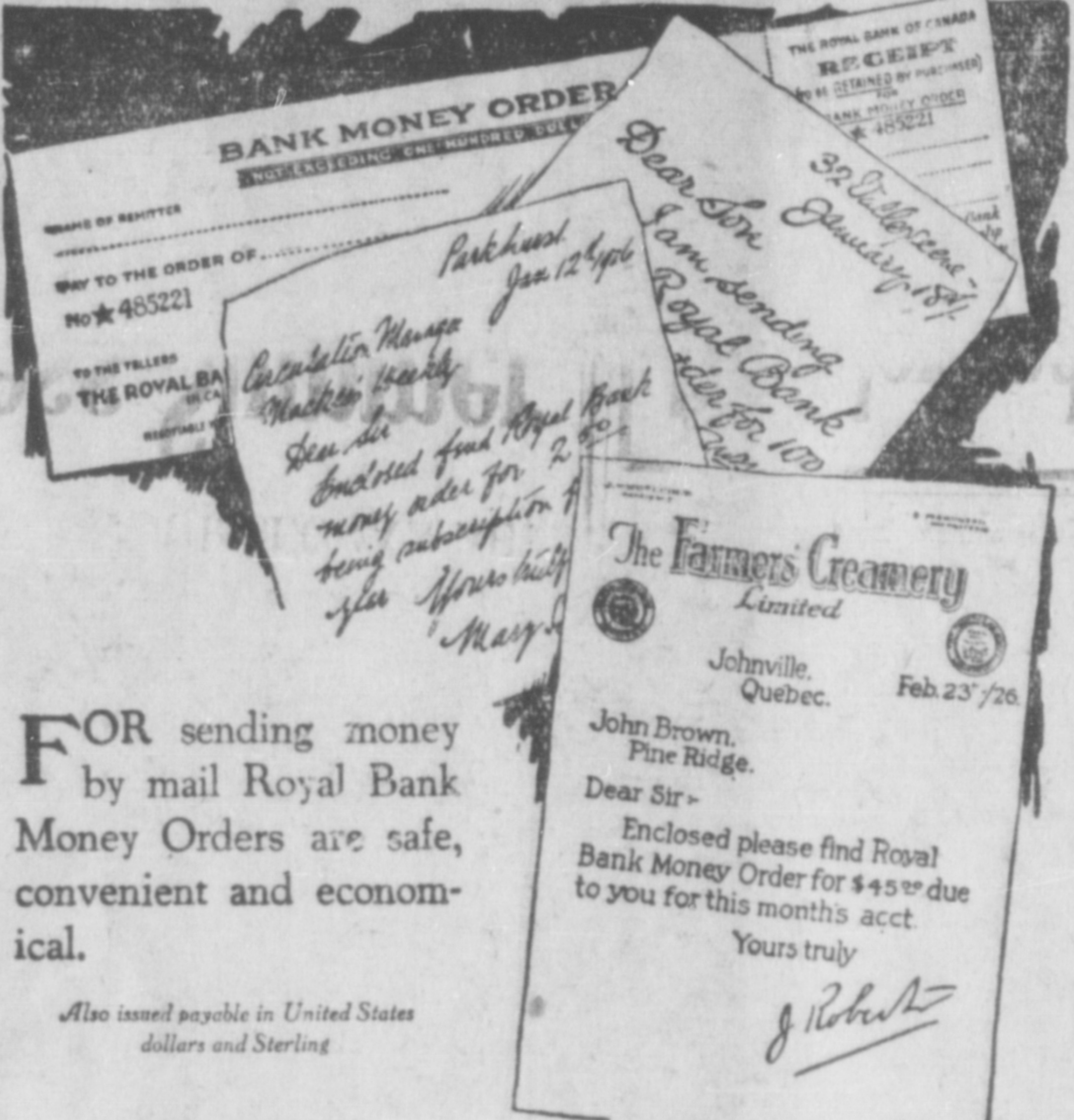

superintendent of the Western Canada Airways Ltd., will be in active charge of the aerial detachment and its operations.

Some of the ships to be used this year will be of the newer Vedette type which are much more speedy and capable of rising to a greater elevation than the old HSL's which have been used here in previous seasons for the fishery patrol. They can attain a ceiling of as high as 1800 feet and are generally more efficient.

The planes will be moved around from base to base as requirements demand.

In compliance with a request recently made by the Prince Rupert Rod and Gun Club the fisheries department landed this morning from the steamer Prince Rupert a large shipment of Kamloops trout eggs which will be placed in Shawatinian and Cloyah Lakes near here for restocking purposes. The shipment includes enough eggs to place in two localities and the planting will be in charge of Major Hearn, superintendent of the Lakeless Hatchery, who arrived in the city from the interior on yesterday afternoon's train. The Rod & Gun Club will give assistance with the distribution in connection with which its wishes will be considered. As the eggs will continue in such state this season, next year becoming small fry, it will be at least two years before angling could affect the results of the planting, possibly, by that time some steps may be taken with a view to protecting the new fish.

Though there has been somewhat of a falling off during the past week or so total halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the season up to yesterday at 10,402,400 pounds were well ahead of the 1927 season at a corresponding date when the total stood at 9,873,800 pounds. As a matter of fact the 1928 landings are approaching the record season of 1926 which at this time stood at 10,613,700 pounds. Of this year's total, 7,413,400 pounds had been from American vessels and 2,989,000 pounds from Canadian. Last year's figures at a similar date were 7,152,600 and 2,721,200 pounds respectively. With some of the Canadian halibut boats now about to enter other pursuits such as salmon packing and fishery patrol, there may be a slight dropping off during the coming summer months although this does not necessarily have to follow.

Landings for the week June 2-8 respectively were a little under average totalling 630,500 pounds of which 428,000 pounds was American and 202,500 Canadian. Prices during this week were at a fair though not spectacular level. The highest bid of the week was 15.7c and 7c paid the American vessels Thelma M., Tahona and Venus for catches of 9,500, 9,500 and 6,500 pounds respectively. The best Canadian price was 9.6c and 6c paid the M.M. Christopher for 9,000 pounds. The lowest bid of the week was 8c and 4c.

Waterfront habitants may rack their heads this week to recollect their ever-seeing or hearing of a larger red spring salmon than was landed yesterday at Inverness Cannery from the Queen Charlotte Islands. The fine big fish, which was the cynosure of all eyes and the subject of much interested examination, tipped the scales at seventy-five pounds. Now you tell a larger real spring salmon story.

HARLAN SMITH WILL CONTINUE DIGGING AND TAKE PICTURES

OTTAWA, June 9.—H. I. Smith, who has been investigating the ancient village sites, shell heaps and rock carvings of the Indians on the coast of British Columbia, will continue this work around Prince Rupert during the summer. During part of the season he will take motion pictures illustrating the manners and customs of some Indian tribes not represented in the four reels which he has already prepared for the National Museum, and which have proved so popular both in Canada and Europe.
