LONDON, January 7.—Overwhelmed with startling suddenness, 20 persons were drowned in the London area today when the most devastating flood in the history of modern London swept the Thames River over its banks at several points. An abnormal tide, whipped by ful master, W. B. Morgan, took charge a heavy gale, met the flood of waters pouring down from the interior and the rush of water was so sudden that hundreds of persons sleeping in basement rooms were driven from their beds, at least 20 being trapped there with the possibility of further victims.

Four Drowned and Two Saved When Schooner Noble Crashed on Rock

Tremendous Seas Running and Schooner Pounded to Pieces Within Hour After Striking Escalante Reef, Vancouver Island

VICTORIA, January 7 .- Four people were drowned when the motor schooner Noble of Vancouver was wrecked on Escalante Reef on the west coast of Vancouver Island, according to word received here. The drowned are Captain J. Kerr, Chief Engineer H. Williams, Chief Officer B. Wall, Cook S. V. Herby. Wireless Officer Cliff Deschamps and Second Engineer F. Bell were taken off by the Tofino lifeboat.
