

NAVIGABLE WATERS' PROTECTION ACT.

Revised Statutes of Canada, Chapter 115

Waterfront Whiffs

Activity Becoming General in Preparation for Opening of Halibut Season—Sea Cadets Awarded Certificates—Preparing for Herring Seining

Featuring the waterfront activities of the past week has been a very general commencement of overhaul work on boats, engines, etc., in preparation for the reopening of the halibut fishing season on February 15—now little more than a month hence. After a few weeks of rather quiet conditions, things are beginning to wake up again and, with spring and its attendant business in the offing, everybody is taking new heart. Machine shops and repair yards are being booked up and, in the approaching pre-season rush of work, all space will be, as usual, taken up, and the whole "front" will be the scene of much hustle and bustle.

A great deal of work must be done in the time intervening if all the boats are to get off to their proper start on the dot and the effect thereof will be generally improved conditions throughout the city. It will be once again proven that, when the fishermen are up and doing, the whole town is the better for it. Close on the halibut fishermen will follow the salmon men in preparation for the 1928 season which everyone hopes will show an improvement over 1927.

The staff of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station was out fishing Thursday morning under the supervision of Acting Director Horace Brocklesby. Their catch in the harbor included two dogfish—a male and a female—and four skate, the gear having been set the night previous. The dogfish were soon butchered to provide Mr. Brocklesby with material for his vitamin content experiments therewith.

What with pilots to deliver to and from grain boats and other general activity, the B.C. Tugage and Lighterage Co. has had a busy week of it.

Having brought Capt. Larry Thomson back from the outgoing freighter Sydney early Monday morning, the Salvage Princess proceeded later in the day to Port Simpson with Dominion Constable A. J. Watkinson, making a trip on official duties and returned on Wednesday, having as an additional passenger a nurse from the hospital staff leaving Port Simpson after two years' service there.

On her return to port, the Salvage Princess went on the pontoons at the dry dock to be sheathed with "iron bark" for navigation in the ice, coming off yesterday and leaving almost immediately for a trip to Anyox.

The Anna S., Capt. Eli Skog, was pressed into the company service on Thursday and took Capt. Larry Thomson out to Triple Island to meet the incoming grain ship, Holmpark, making an all day wait before the ship, delayed outside by storms, was picked up.

The Anna S. also made a trip out yesterday to Rose Spit where Capt. J. R. Elfer met the freighter Levenpool to pilot her in.

Capt. Paul Armour, manager of the B.C. Tugage & Lighterage Co., sailed this morning by the Cardena on a business trip to Vancouver. He will return to the city in a week or ten days' time.

AN ARDUOUS TRIP

Inspector William Spiller, Sergeant Alex McNeill and Deputy Coroner J. R. Tannock had a rather arduous trip of it in getting to Stewart this week to investigate a shooting case which took place there last Sunday. Embarking aboard the steamer Canosun Monday morning, they had barely passed the mouth of the harbor when the vessel was seized with internal complaint, necessitating the throwing over of the "mud hook." An "S.O.S." was sent down as a result of which the P.R.B.H. powerboat Pachena was despatched out to take them off the steamer and continue to Stewart. The weather became

rather stormy and the Pachena was forced into shelter at Fort Simpson.

The Canosun, having been given a tonic, hove into sight in the meantime and the officers re-embarked upon her, continuing to Stewart thereby while the Pachena returned to town.


