# PATTULLO ON TIMBER POLICY

Rebuttal of Statements Made in Regard to Lack of Policy of His Department

## PLENTY OF TIMBER YET

Good Policy to Cut Present Stands as They are Mature and Second Growth Follows

VICTORIA, Feb. 20.—The forest wealth of British Columbia is safe under the conservation policy of the Liberal government, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, declared in the Legislature as he supported an investigation of the entire timber situation by a house committee.

After listening to the minister's ringing defence of his forest administration and his demand that the Conservative party come out in the open and announce its timber policy, the House endorsed a resolution referring timber questions to a special committee for investigation.

This motion was moved originally by Ian MacKenzie, Liberal of Vancouver, while Joshua Hinchliffe, Conservative of Victoria, moved in amendment that Mr. Pattullo be required to submit a written statement on the timber situation to the assembly. By a vote of twenty-five to twenty the House rejected the Hinchliffe amendment and supported the MacKenzie motion. D. A. Stoddart, Provincial, and R. H. Neelands, Frank Browne and Thomas Uphill, Labor, supported the Mackenzie motion with the government. Major R. J. Burde, Independent, P. P. Harrison, Liberal, and A. McC. Creery, Provincial, voted for the Hinchliffe amendment with the opposition.

In a masterly address on forestry Mr. Pattullo sought to show that the government has forest problems well in hand, and that there is no need for public alarm over the depletion of British Columbia timber.

**DEFIES DEPLETION TALK**  
Mr. Pattullo denied at the outset the statement of C. S. Leary, Liberal of Kaslo-Slocan, that the British Columbia stand of mature Douglas fir would be depleted in twelve years. There was enough mature fir in the Esquimalt & Nanaimo Railway belt of Vancouver Island alone to keep loggers busy for this period, he said.

"In addition we have splendid stands of fir from ten to forty years of age," he said.  
"I would ask those who are continually alarming the public, what is their remedy? Would they not cut the timber? As a matter of fact, it should be cut, or you won't get a second growth. If you want to have forests near Vancouver and Victoria you must

control cutting and shut down half the mills. And then all that will happen is that logging will be moved to more inaccessible places. I am in a position of responsibility and I ask those who are not and are causing public alarm what they propose to do? Let them say whether they would stop this cutting or not!"

## MUST COMPETE

High-lead logging, the minister went on, was extremely destructive, but was necessary here, as it was used in the United States, the great competitor of British Columbia.

"We must keep the lumber industry going now as well as providing for the future," he warned. "We know of the present waste; we know how this wasted lumber could be made into by-products, but our problem is that we can't get markets for such products. In the old world markets are available, but they don't exist here at present."

## EUROPE'S EXPERIENCE

Mr. Pattullo pointed out that the experience of European countries with forestry could not be used safely as a guide in British Columbia, where conditions were utterly different. This province, he said, must evolve its own methods by experience now under way. He reminded the House that artificial planting had been largely abandoned in Europe and the best authorities now agreed that natural regeneration was far better than artificial methods. Natural re-growth was re-stocking the forest lands of British Columbia, he said, in a highly satisfactory way. In some places re-growth covered as much as 80 per cent of logged-off areas. This, with artificial assistance in some places, would meet the situation here, he asserted.

The minister told the House in detail of experiments conducted by the forestry service to show how natural regeneration was going on.

# ADDRESS GIVEN BY RABBI STERN

Prejudice Against Jew Must go Declares Speaker at Kiwanis Luncheon

MONTREAL, Feb. 20.—Prejudice against the Jew must be discarded and a closer link of fellowship be welded among all religions if a better understanding among the peoples of the world is to be brought about, Rabbi Harry Stern of Emmanu-El Temple, said in addressing fellow members of the Montreal Kiwanis Club at the weekly luncheon meeting in the Windsor Hotel.

"Thank God today," said Rabbi Stern, "that I sit at this head table alongside a Catholic priest and a Protestant clergyman. It has been prejudice in the past which has held the Jew down. We were persecuted from every angle. We have also been called the Christ killers. I wish to speak to you of my people as the Christ betrayers. Why blame the Jew if Christ had to die in order to save the world? It was the wish of God. If the Nazarene forgave them how much more the followers of Nazarene should forgive."

Rabbi Stern said that the Jewish side of prejudice toward Christianity was summoned up in the quotation: "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do."

The present psychological revolution which the world is passing through is doing much toward welding all in one common bond of fellowship and service, he said. War is about to be outlawed by civilization through education and through sentiment created by such service organizations as Kiwanis. During the war Jew and Gentile united without prejudice and should carry on in times of peace if a better understanding of each other is to be accomplished, he concluded.

Over 200 horned owls have been brought in for the bounty since December, from all points on the Island between Rocky Point and Gordon Head.
