After listening to the minister's ringing defence of his forest administration and his demand that the Conservative party come out in the open and announce its timber policy, the House endorsed a resolution referring timber questions to a special committee for investigation.

This motion was moved originally by Ian MacKenzie, Liberal of Vancouver, while Joshua Hinchliffe, Conservative of Victoria, moved in amendment that Mr. Pattullo be required to submit a written statement on the timber situation to the assembly. By a vote of twentyfive to twenty the House rejected the Hinchliffe amendment and supported the MacKenzie motion. D. A.
