### BIGGEST CROP ALL HISTORY

FORT WILLIAM, Aug. 11-Granted favorable weather until harvesting is well under way, probably in two weeks, the Canadian farmers will garner the biggest crop in history of the Dominion, says E. A. Ursell, statistician to the board of grain commissioners, in a monthly report on the crop movement.
