(continued from page 1) and fell, striking her head on a rock in the road or on a guard rail.

Both W. E. Fisher, crown prosecutor and Milton Gonzales, defence council in addressing the jury, asked that the reasonableness of the story of their respective witnesses be believed.

The judge commented but briefly in charging the jury. The case was largely a matter of fact, he said, with little law involved.

The verdict was reached at 12.45 noon after but 15 minutes deliberation.

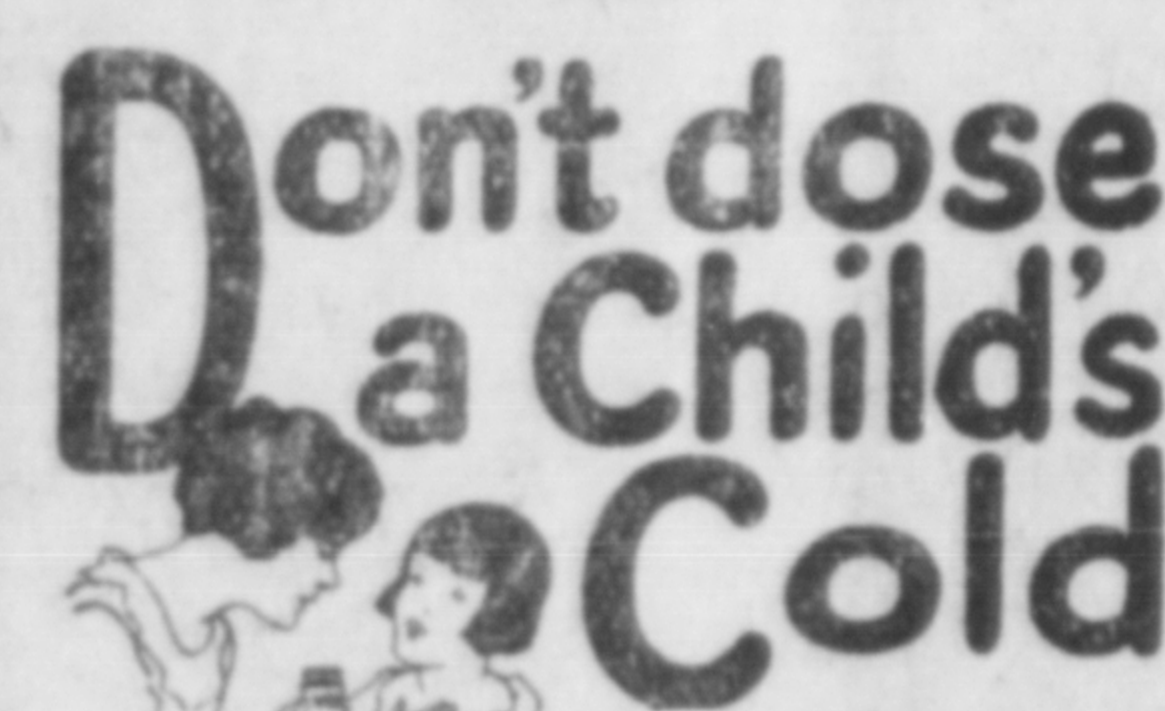

### JURY LIST IS CAUSE OF DELAY

Assizes Adjourn Soon After Sitting Yesterday Afternoon Owing to Error

The assizes were adjourned soon after being called yesterday afternoon. The accused man in murder case, Fritz Turner, was brought into court and the charge against him of having unlawfully killed another man named Kristiansen at Raphoe Point in Dean Channel was read. A Finnish interpreter named Helge Elkengren of Vancouver was sworn and the prisoner pleaded "not guilty." Archie Johnson, K.C., assisted by W. E. Fisher appeared for the Crown and Milton Gonzales was appointed by the judge to represent the prisoner. Mr. Gonzales asked for time to prepare his case and it was set for Thursday morning.

It was reported to the court by Mr. Johnson that owing to jurors outside the jurisdiction having been called, the jury list was illegal and should be cancelled. This was done and after hearing counsel Mr. Justice McDonald ordered the sheriff to prepare a new jury list of 48 and submit them at the opening of court this morning at 10.30 when the assault case of Rex versus Contois would be proceeded with.

### CITY JAIL IN GOOD CONDITION REPORTS JURY ON INSPECTION

P. W. Anderson, foreman of the Grand Jury at the Assizes, which was excused from further service this morning, announced that an inspection of the city jail had been made by the jury and that the premises were found to be in a satisfactory condition.

At the conclusion of the Contois case at 12.15 noon, the session of the Supreme Court Assizes was adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon. It is possible that the Anyox attempted murder case may be proceeded with before the Dean Channel murder.
