Suggestion of Rev. A. Wilson at Rotary Luncheon Subject of Conversation Yesterday

Much interest was taken last night by readers of The Daily News in the proposal outlined at the Rotary Club luncheon that a musical festival should be organized at Prince Rupert for the coming spring. The matter was one of the chief subjects of conversation in musical circles.

In his address Rev. A. Wilson suggested that as there was a flourishing organization of the kind in the Okanagan and another had just been formed between Nelson and Trail, it should not be impossible for Prince Rupert to form a similar organization. In regard to adjudicators, he mentioned that at Terrace there was a talented pianist, who might be prevailed upon to judge in that department. If money was required it should be forthcoming for so laudable a purpose. May had been suggested as a suitable month for the festival.

Mr. Wilson suggested that there might be competitions among boys of the boys' band as soloists. There could be piano, violin and vocal competitions and of course there would be choirs and possibly bands. Also, he proposed an oratorical contest. The festival could commence in a small way, he thought. The great thing was to make a beginning.

Mr. Wilson did not suggest that the Rotary Club should undertake the organization of such a festival, but that the members should give it their support. He said he knew some of the members were interested, as they had been members of a committee formed some time ago to try to organize, but which had given it up as impracticable on account of the cost of securing proper adjudicators.

Mr. Wilson was thanked for his address by James Thompson, chairman for the day.
