EDMONTON, July 5 .- Search for a secret gold mine is to made by means of a Fokker seaplane expected to arrive here in a few days. "Although the Indians had left their ans and shovels right where they had been working, and their camp-sites were there, too, there wasn't a single sign of a fire."
