

Railways in the past week as compared with a year ago, the loading over-topped last year's record by nearly three million bushels. In the seven days ending yesterday, 10,053,000 bushels were marketed, as compared with 11,982,000 but 10,343000 bushels (7,757 cars) were loaded as against 7,822,000 (5,987 cars).

There is in storage 34,586,000 bushels, as compared with 10,521,-000. An increase of something short of 30,000,000 bushels. From August 1 this season, 68,579,000 bushels have been loaded. During the same period last year the sum was 33,397,00.

Saskatchewan leads the other provinces in loading and marketing, having loaded nearly 6,000 .-000 bushels and marketed nearly 5,000,000.
