RUM RUNNERS CAPTURED ON NIAGARA

PATTULLO LIKELY TO LEAD OPPOSITION IN LEGISLATURE

Greatest Storm In Years Blowing In Gulf Of Alaska And Halibut Boats Driven From The Banks

Hene Damaged Rudder and Pilot House After Being Ten Hours at Mercy of Waves: Mail Motorship is Probably Lost

SEWARD, October 19. — A southeaster that swept ne seas from the mouth of Resurrection Bay to the westward of Kodiak has driven practically all the halibut fleet from the banks and nearly brought disaster to

The Ilene of Ketchikan struggled into Seward with a disabled rudder and damaged pilot house when hit by a wave off Portlock and drifted ten hours at the mercy of the waves before the crew managed to make repairs.

Buffeted between the Barren Islands and Cape Elizabeth the Donna Long, a herring ship of Utopian Fisheries, has the windows of both sides of the upper leck stove in, her hold flooded and the deck load washed overboard.

At Kodiak and Cook Inlet no herring have arrived et and hope for the season has been practically aban-

Grave anxiety is felt here for the safety of the moorship Discoverer, Captain Heinie Berger, which is reorted to have left Seldovia Saturday morning for eward. The vessel is five days overdue as Seldovia is ut a day's run from Seward.

The greatest storm in years is blowing over this part of Alaska and it may have caught the Discoverer near Sheliker Strait. The U.S. commissioners here plans to send relief boats from Seward and Seldovia. The Discoverer carries mail between Seward and Cook Inlet points and Anchorage.

In view of a possible disaster Seward shipping interests will renew their urgent demands that a coast guard cutter be stationed here through the winter months as shipping is without safeguards of any kind.

ONE OUTLET FROM PEACE AT RUPERT

Forecasting immediate plans to extend the northern Alberta lines to the Pacific in order to meet the demands of the Peace River, the Winnipeg Free Press in a double column editorial says it is a job for the two railway companies acting in concert. After discussing the amazing fertility and growth of that section the paper says:

"The advantage to the dominion in having the two railway systems co-operating in the Peace River country is apparent. It is evident the Canadian National could not permit that great area to pass into the exclusive control of the Canadian Pacific, If that were attempted the Canadian National would have to build its own lines into that cistrict. It is also obvious that the Peace River country, at a date not very far in the future, must have a direct outlet to the Pacific coast either by using the port of Prince Rupert or by the development of another Pacific port north of Prince Rupert.

"If the two systems were in the Peace River on a competitive basis, the result would likely to be the building of two outlets to the Pacific coast. At present it does not look as if this were necessary. One line to the coast, to be used jointly, would serve the purpose, would result in the saving of money, and by that saving would provide a lower rate structure.

"The day may not be far distant when the Peace River will require an outlet to the east as well as to the west."

It is not quite certain that Mr. Pattullo would accept the position but should he do so he would be in line for the premiership whenever the Liberals returned to power.

There is talk of a Liberal convention for the purpose of appointing a leader of the party, but that is not likely to happen until next year. In the meantime it will be necessary for the House leader to prepare for the work.
