## Saturday Sermon

### GOD'S SALVATION

By REV. FRED ANTROBUS

"And it was revealed unto Him by the Holy Spirit, that he should not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ."—Luke 2:25-35.

According to the evangelist Luke, there were many who were living in expectation of the coming of the Messiah—"all them who looked for redemption in Jerusalem." Among them was one obscure man, a God-fearing man, named Simeon, who comes into prominence, and receives abiding remembrance throughout this whole age of grace because linked by the Spirit of God with the great Redeemer of men, the Lord Jesus Christ.

#### 1. GOD'S SALVATION.

"My eyes have seen Thy salvation." Simeon had been told by the Spirit, that he should live to see the Lord's Christ; and in that happy moment, of taking the Babe into his arms—the Babe so recently born in Bethlehem, over Whom the angels sang, and of Whom the angel said, "Unto you is born in the city of David, a Saviour, Who is Christ the Lord"—he declared

Him to be God's salvation; he made ready confession of his faith to all present.

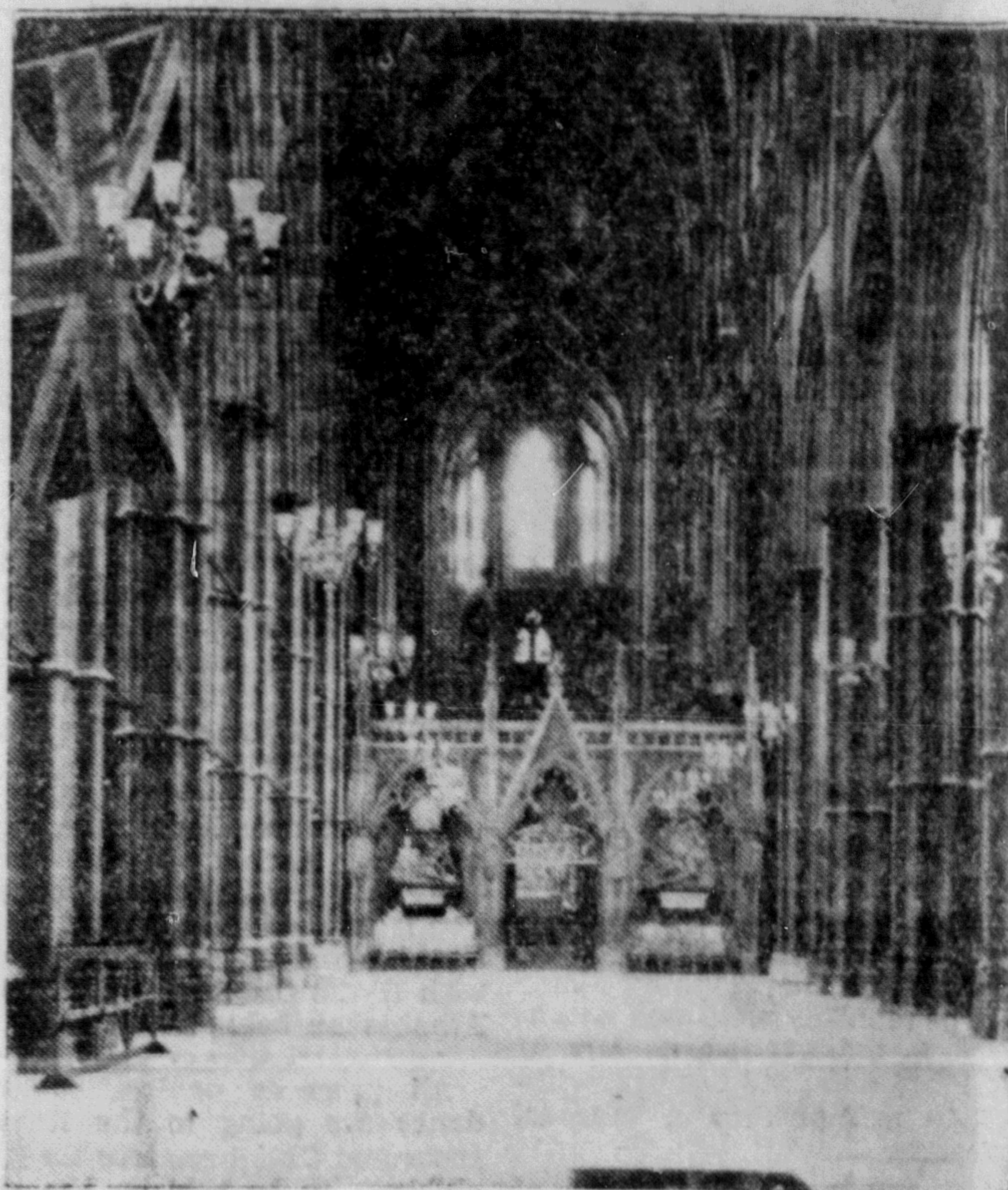
O that all those who remember His birthday could have such a vision, which would lead them to make the same confession—"my eyes have seen Thy salvation." Peter said, there was no salvation to be found in any other than Jesus Christ, the one crucified, but now risen and ascended Lord. And time and testing have both proved it beyond a doubt, for thousands have been and are being "saved," from the penalty and power of sin; the dominion of self; the tyranny of Satan; the allures of the world; and the snare of self.

#### 2. GOD'S PREPARATION.

"Which Thou hast prepared before the face of all people." That preparation was begun "before the foundation of the world," in the counsels of God. It was made known as soon as man had sinned—the promise of a Redeemer—Gen. 3:15. That preparation was made known by the prophets, and seen in the sacrifices offered for sin, which pointed forward to the "Lamb of God, Who takes away the sins of the world."

That preparation was especially seen when Christ was born in Bethlehem; and was completed when Jesus Christ Who was God the Son, went to Calvary in our place, and on behalf of our sins; for the cradle of Bethlehem, and the Cross of Calvary must be considered together; the cradle leads to the Cross.

This was to lead up to the final enjoyment of the home which He has gone to "prepare," for all those who are prepared in their hearts by that blessed Spirit—

## Warming Halls Thrown Open

BERLIN (Reuters)—Ragged Berliners too poor to buy coal are spending hours huddled in almost bare "warming halls" thrown open to them by the city government. While the temperature drops below freezing outside, old folks sit about a few tables and broken-down chairs knitting and gossiping.

No one knows how long the "warming halls" have been in existence. "Certainly longer than anyone now alive can remember," a city official said. "Certainly they were there before the turn of the century and we started them again after the war as soon as we had enough coal."

Admission to the halls is free and many oldsters from Soviet Berlin slip across the boundary to get warm.

Each district has three or four and can open more should the need arise. They can accommodate from 50 to 200 persons and

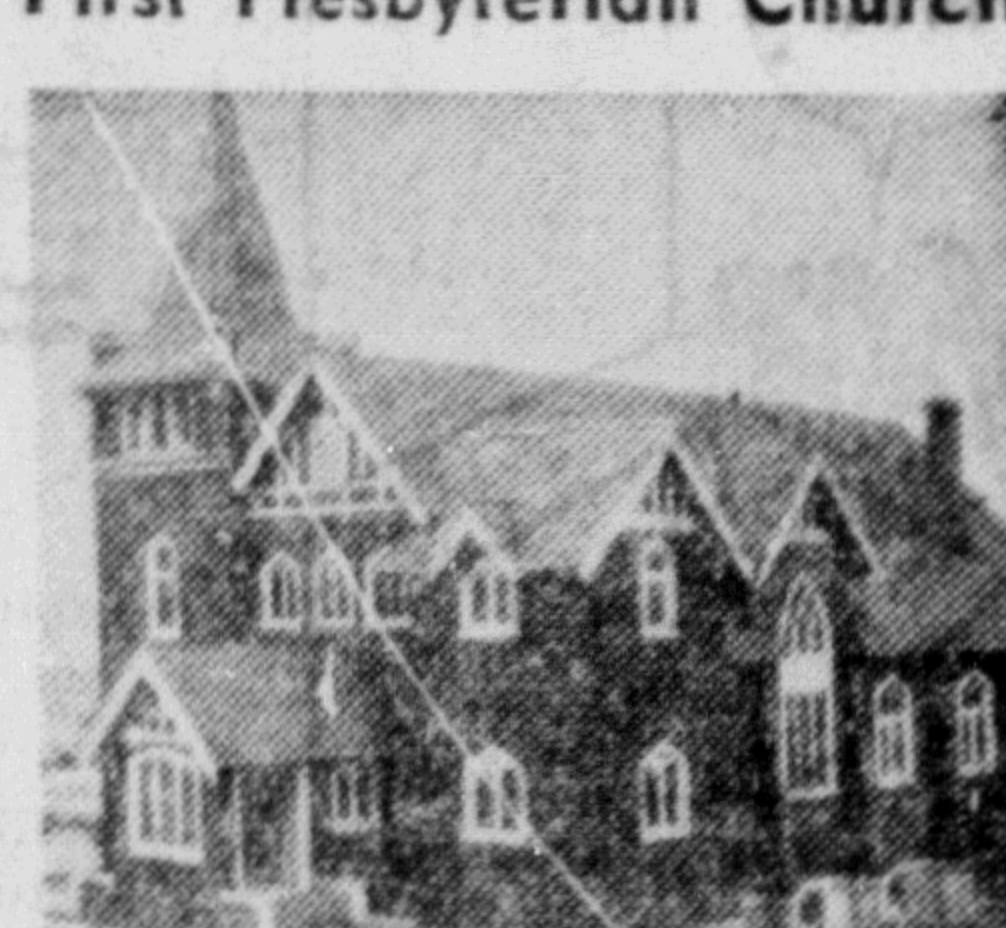
