KIWANIS CLUB PARTY IS HERE

LARGEST SINGLE TOURIST GROUP TO VISIT CITY SO FAR THIS SEASON ARRIVE TODAY

Some one hundred and fifty members of the Kiwanis Club from New England States and Eastern Canada, forming a delegation which will attend an International convention in Seattle next week, are paying a brief visit to the city this afternoon. About one hundred members of the party arrived on a special train from Duluth which reached here at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon while the remaining fifty came in on the regular train at 3:30. They will embark about 4 p.m. on the steamer Prince Rupert which will take them to Seattle, calling enroute at Ocean Falls, Powell River, Vancouver and Victoria.

The party, the largest single tourist group to visit the city so far this summer, was accompanied from Jasper Park by R. F. McNaughton, district passenger agent for the Canadian National Railways.
