### Land of the Future

A LTHOUGH the Canadian north is hailed as the land of the future, Canadians themselves are not doing much to contribute to this destiny. As it stands now, the northern two-thirds of Canada have less than 100,000 people. The country, in fact, has no city of more than 50,000 north of Edmonton, whereas Russia has at least 50, including Moscow.

The remedy seems to lie in making Canadians hetter acquainted with conditions in the north. An example is found in the common conception of the little-known country lying between Hudson Bay and the Mackenzie River. Far from being barren as is generally supposed, this territory contains almost limitless stretches of arable land which is seasonally covered with a healthy growth of vegetation.

Inhabitants of the fertile Hay Valley, approximately 1,000 miles north of our main cities, are able to youch that they enjoy approximately 40 more hours of sunshine per year than their southern countrymen, and that their average summer temperature is only about 10 degrees lower. Explorers north of the arctic circle have often found themselves sweltering in more than 90 degrees.

The opportunities awaiting pioneers in the north are numberless. In the Peace River Valley of Alberta it is estimated that two and a half million acres are awaiting settlement. In the Yukon there is another half-million acres of good farm land, and northern B.C. has another million acres-all available as crown land for a few cents an acre.

Development of fur and timber industries in this area has been hardly touched. Mining experts also maintain that there are rich deposits of copper, zine, silver, gold and tin in a territory which has scarcely been mapped, let alone prospected.

Although the northern oil industry is enjoying spectacular prosperity, it is estimated that north of the 60th parallel there is a half-million square miles of Canadian land favorable to oil deposits which are virtually unexplored.

Prospects such as these throw a flickering light on the cautious predictions that Canada will gain 20 million or so in population by the turn of the century. The predictions may be accurate enough, but surely we are capable of promoting our country to an extent whereby that figure would be multiplied by at least five times.

### Health Leagues Everywhere

THE HEALTH LEAGUE OF unique organization.

Recently the World Health Organization announced that citizens committees to promote health will be formed in the various countries associated with WHO to assist in creating public opinion. The WHO through its director, Dr. Gordon Bates, has stated that the Health League of Canada is really the kind of organization needed and has invited the Health League to become the voluntary body representing World Health Organization in this country.

The Health League of Canada is of value because it is a voluntary body and voluntary associations are essential in all continuing democracies if we are to escape the dreaded totalitarianism. Similarly the Health League of Canada represents no special interest.

On its general council there are more than 60 nationally organized societies represented-medical and lay. This is a recognition of the fact that health is not only the business of the doctor and the health official but everybody's business.

Laws for the promotion of health may be suggested by the doctor or the scientist but the force of public opinion is needed before they can get on the statute books. We need look no farther than the fact that in Canada there are still eight provinces which lack province-wide compulsory pasteurization of milk. Every doctor knows that we should have such laws.

Unfortunately, to date public opinion (theopinion of the average citizen) has only been sufficiently organized in two provinces to result in government action.

The Health League of Canada should be made as efficient as possible in Canada and every effort should be made to create similar leagues in other countries.
