## SPORT CHAT

Tommy Loughran is without doubt the cleverest boxer in the heavy weight class today, now that Gene Tunney has stepped down and out of his way. As a boxer I think he is just as clever as Tunney, but lacks the punch that the retired champion carried. Loughran has speed and gameness. He is a clever and intelligent fighter on the type of Freddy Welsh, the lightweight, who was fast and clever but not a puncher. Loughran scores points rapidly in a fight, but does very little damage to the other fellow. On the other hand he is very hard to hit. In his fight in Brooklyn with Lonski he showed what a great ring general he was. He was knocked down twice in the first round and was pretty nearly out, yet he came through in spite of this set-back and won the decision.

The 1932 Olympic games at Los Angeles will have to worry along without European competition in rowing, swimming, tennis, and soccer football unless the international Olympic committee grants representation to the associations governing these sports. declared Gaston Vidal, chairman of the French Olympic committee. With inside development in European sports diplomacy and intrigue, this round-faced, twinkling-eyed Frenchman is on the most intimate terms. He told in picturesque English of "what you call—struggle" now on between the international rowing, swimming, tennis and soccer associations on the one hand and the Olympic governing body on the other. Clearly in sympathy with the associations in their demands for representations on the Olympic committee, M. Vidal referred to the latter organization as a "staff officers without any troops."

## COMMENT ON TUNNEY SALON

Former World Champion and Wife Going in for Literature in London

It is reported from London that Gene Tunney and his bride are establishing a home here, where they will form a literary salon. How much the retired champion's cultural hunger is genuine is something on which the most diverse opinions are being expressed. The subject is considered of sufficient importance for an article in the Atlantic Monthly. Tunney having been invited to lecture at Harvard, it is not to be wondered at that what is regarded as a highbrow magazine should address itself to the theme.

The writer's conclusion is that the pugilist began to talk about his love of good literature simply as a publicity stunt and that he did not have any more literary appreciation than the celebrated motion picture actress who purchased her books according to the color of their covers so as to match her frocks. But pose, we are told, soon gave way to curiosity and then to a real desire to become acquainted with the treasures of the language.

"They became," this authority continues, "a sort of fierce solace, a refuge, an ungrat for his blisters. I think there was a slight gesture of scorn in there too. I also think that it was just about here that he got in over his depth, that he went slightly punch-drunk, or slug-nutty, as the boys say, from resounding polysyllables and booming paragraphs that bounced back from the wall against his uninsulated eardrums."

This phase, however, is represented as purely temporary. Tunney is still "hurrying somewhat blindly to make up for lost time and has drunk his words in such gargantuan gulps that he is philosophically intoxicated." But confidence is expressed that "his head will clear and so will his vocabulary," as he is "sound steel and seasoned hickory underneath it all."

The process is after all not a wholly new one. Many others have had a somewhat similar ex-
