PASSENGER PLANE CRASHES CALGARY

MESSAGES SAID TO HAVE BEEN RECEIVED FROM PLANET

Winnipeg-Calgary Air Mail Biplane Burned Passengers Escaped

Machine When Rising After Accident, Hits airbump and Crashes into Road Catching Fire Immediately.

CALGARY, Oct. 24.—Hitting an air bump when taking off from a stubble field seven miles east of here at two o'clock yesterday afternoon, an airmail bi-plane of the western Canada Airways crashed into a bank on the side of the Calgary-Strathmore road and was destroyed by fire. The passengers and pilots escaped with minor burns.

at luncheon today.


WELL KNOWN
