fact that the board of works had authorized the expenditure of \$50 in taking stumps out of the park. He felt that probably more like \$100 had now been spent on that work. He urged the growing of flowers and gardens with spare time being used in clearing up the grounds.

Ald. Collart observed that it was apparently the board of works which was carrying out park work in the city. Was the parks board defunct he enquired.

HAS NO POWER

Mayor McMordie explained that the parks board was merely an advisory body and had no power to spend money. Expenditures must be made under the board of works.

"Then there is no use of having a parks board at all," felt Ald. Collart. Ald. Greer explained that the laying of a sewer was in progress and there was a big ditch, through the park now which was dangerous for children. This was why the park had been closed.

Mayor McMordie suggested that the members of the council visit the park with a view to deciding whether it was advisable to reopen it under present conditions.

Ald. Collart moved that the program accepted by the council earlier in the season with a view to city beautification be followed up and that the money be

applied by the parks board to the various proposals set out therein. He mentioned that an appropriation of \$900 had been made in the estimates for such work.

Mayor McMordie felt that the salary of Mr. Riffou, the park caretaker, would probably take that pretty well all up.

Ald. Collart outlined some of the proposals that had been made such as the giving of prizes for gardens and window boxes and improvements in various parts of the city including the survey of the park. He felt that the money should not be spent solely in blowing up stumps in the park.

After further discussion of the matter it was decided to receive a report upon what had been done. It is possible that there will be another conference between members of the city council, the board of works and parks board on the matter.

SILENCE THAT COULD BE FELT

CURIOUS LITTLE INCIDENT IN OTTAWA HOUSE PRIOR TO PROLOGATION

OTTAWA, June 12.—During the dying days of the session there was not much of interest except the obstructive methods of the Conservative group headed by R. B. Bennett, their millionaire leader. However there were incidents and here is one.

It seems that a few years ago a Government boat—the Vigilant, was sold to a Liberal member and this seems to have just come to light and the Conservatives scented something that they might "hang on to" the Liberal Government. They asked questions about it and suggested graft. Mr. Black of Halifax was the most insistent and he did not hesitate to suggest that somebody had made money out of it. Manion of Fort William followed it up. The papers were brought down and it was found that the boat was sold by the Conservative Government preceding this. There was a silence that could be felt.

FISHERMAN FOUND DEAD

BODY OF SAMUEL ROACH, AGED 80, DISCOVERED IN SHACK AT SEAL COVE ON SUNDAY

Found dead in his shack in Sourdough Bay near Seal Cove Sunday night, the body of Samuel Roach, eighty-year old fisherman, was taken charge of by the district detachment of the provincial police and, after due examination, it was established that death had been from natural causes. It was believed that Roach had died about 11 o'clock on the morning of the day of the discovery of his body. Though deceased has been around here for some time, little is known of his personal affairs and, if he has relatives, the police have not yet been advised. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of Hayner Bros., undertakers.

LOUIS POWELL, WELL KNOWN METLAKATLA MAN, DIES SUDDENLY

Louis Powell, well known Metlakatla native, died suddenly last night at his home in the neighboring village. He was 50 years of age and is survived by his aged parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Powell, whose eldest son he was; a widow and family, and several sisters. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers and service and interment will take place Thursday afternoon.
