BOARD PLANS TO MAKE BEGINNING IN BEAUTIFYING GROUNDS AT THAT INSTITUTION

Last night the Hospital Board, with James Thompson presiding, gave authority to the grounds committee presided over by M. M. Stephens to commence improving the grounds at the General Hospital and authority was given to make expenditures with that in view to an amount not to exceed \$200.
Following the decision in regard to the tennis court, Mr. Stephens explained that they were planning to make the grounds more attractive by digging, grubbing and stumping and putting some of the land into grass and flowers. A lot of the plants he expected would be donated.
Chairman Thompson remarked that the place looked very bare and life at a hospital was gloomy enough without that. He thought something should be done.
Discussion followed in regard to getting trees and shrubs from the city and in regard to the cost of the work, and on motion of H. B. Rochester, the authority was given.

THE HOSPITAL CANNOT AFFORD TENNIS COURT: AN ESTIMATE OF COST

The question of making a wooden tennis court at the Hospital was discussed at some length by the Hospital board and it was finally decided to lay it over indefinitely owing to the high cost. M. M. Stephens, on behalf of the grounds committee gave details of their investigations. He estimated the total cost would be from \$1,350 to \$1,400. The estimate was made up something like this:
21,000 feet lumber \$680
Cost of erecting 350
Hardware 100
Painting 150
Preparing land, etc. 100
While there were general expressions of opinion in favor of the court it was felt that the cost at present was prohibitive.
