## SUPPLYING CASE IN CITY POLICE COURT

Charge Against Ambrose Reid Falls and Erma Oakes is Remanded for Eight Days—Indian Woman Ordered Away

Magistrate McClymont was engaged in city police court this morning with consideration of four cases under the Indian Act. Erma Oakes, Western Rooms, was remanded for eight days on a charge of supplying; a similar charge against Ambrose Reid was dismissed, and one against Johnny Larson was withdrawn. Susan Leighton, alleged to have been supplied, was fined \$15 and ordered out of town.

According to evidence in the Reid case, accused was given money and sent out by Erma Oakes to buy a bottle from which Susan Leighton was given drink. E. F. Jones, city solicitor, prosecuting, argued that Reid had thereby procured or connived in the procuring of liquor for the Indian woman. L. W. Patmore, counsel for Reid, successfully claimed that accused could not be held to have procured liquor directly for the Indian. He had, instead, obtained liquor for Erma Oakes who, being white, was entitled to have same. It was the Oakes woman and not Reid who had done the supplying. The magistrate accepted this view and dismissed the case.

The informations were brought by Dominion Constable A. J. Watkinson.

## CHICAGO MACHINE GUNS FOR KILLING WOLVES

## GROUP SYSTEM OF GOVERNMENT

HON. C. A. DUNNING URGES EVILS OF SYSTEM AND POINTS TO EXAMPLES OF IT

Hon. C. A. Dunning, minister of railways in a recent speech, criticized the system of group government. Following is the Hansard report of what he said in regard to this:

Just before I conclude I would like to say a few words with reference to group government, which was advocated so forcibly, so wittily and so cleverly yesterday by my hon. friend from Southeast Grey (Miss Macphail). I will not attempt to follow her in any sense; We always enjoy her witticisms even at our own expense, but with respect to this advocacy of group government I do believe it is time the people of Canada realized and faced what group government means and what it would mean to this country. We were told by my hon. friend that it is a Progressive measure but, Mr. Speaker, I regard it as one of the most reactionary moves it would be possible to make. Is this a new thing? Why, Mr. Speaker, Europe is trying now to overcome the effects of group government in many countries. The development of this so-called group system has gone so far in Italy as to produce a chaos sufficient to make the people even welcome a dictator, and it produced the same result in Spain. I know my hon. friend will say that she does not mean that kind of a group; she means an economic group, but she did not explain how she would prevent people from organizing under any group, name or designation. If we have a Labor group, a Progressive group or a Farmer group, why not a Catholic group, a Methodist group and a Presbyterian group? That system has been the curse of Europe.

Certainly the party system has demerits, but an impartial examination of the history of those countries which have tried this group system reveals the weakness of the very position adopted by my hon. friend. What does she say? She says what they want is a little group in that corner of the house just large enough to bludgeon the larger group across the floor into carrying out their wishes, and in so saying she poses as an advocate of democracy! I say, Mr. Speaker, that group government is the negation of democracy. Then I know my hon. friend will say that she means co-operative government. That is a very good phrase, but we have an example of co-operative government in this house today, and the men who are co-operating receive nothing but abuse from hon. members in the far corner. There are some men in this House who, while holding strong views with respect to fiscal policy and other matters of principle, believe they can best accomplish their duty to this country by co-operating with others who are substantially like-minded, to move the wheel of progress forward even a little. They do not sit up on the fence and howl like my hon. friends in the opposite corner.

In conclusion—and I say this with the utmost good humor—I would not deny my hon. friends the right to organize in any way they see fit, but I would point out that once the virus of the group system starts to spread in this country it will be found to be a great breeder; it reproduces very rapidly. The experience of years in Europe indicates that once there is a division beyond two or three parties in a great parliament it soon separates until government is only possible by a species of log-rolling and dealing which I feel sure would be repugnant to the Canadian people and would not redound to the credit of the country.
