

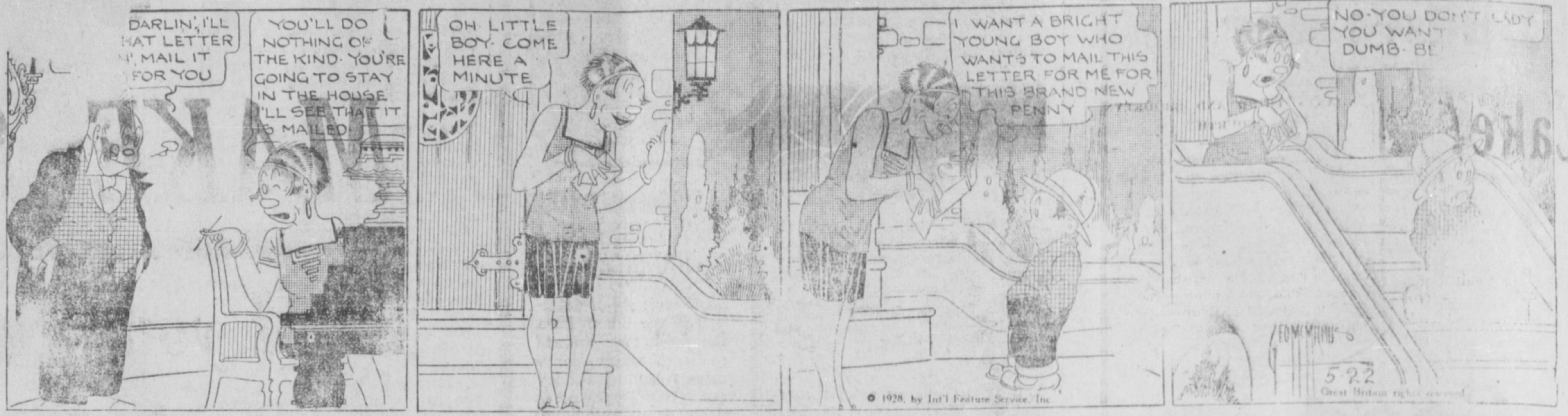

NEW ELEVATORS PEACE RIVER

GILLESPIE COMPANY TO ERECT SIX HOUSES IN ADDITION TO 62 ALREADY IN ALBERTA.

EDMONTON, May 22.—Swinging into action for the big grain rush expected next season, the Gillespie Grain Company, Limited, is planning to erect about six elevators this year. John Gillespie, president of the firm, which has its head office in this city, stated that the building program is now being considered, while the locations will naturally depend upon the securing of suitable sites for these new houses.

The erection of six new elevators each with a capacity for 40,000 bushels, would cost about \$85,000. These plants would be at points in the Peace River country and probably along the new C.P.R. line now being extended from Willingdon to Edmonton. At present, this firm is operating 62 elevators in this province, a number having been added last year.

"Our reports show that the crop is going in fine shape, and as there is plenty of moisture for some time, it should have the advantage of very desirable growing conditions," said Mr. Gillespie. "It looks as if there will be an increase of about 10 per cent. in the grain acreage in central and northern Alberta."

Referring to the outlook for prices on this year's grain crop, Mr. Gillespie said the prospects were fair for an average price. There had been considerable damage to the winter wheat crop in the United States, giving many the belief that future prices will be fairly good. At the same time, an important factor would be the spring wheat yields in the United States and Canada, as the obvious result of a poor crop would be high prices, he said.

RADIO BROADCAST FOR FISHERMEN OF THE ATLANTIC COAST

Department of Marine and Fisheries Sends Out News, Market and Weather Reports

HALIFAX, May 23.—Nova Scotia fishermen, accustomed to spending long weeks on the fishing banks each year, their only communication with the world the occasional speaking of a passing steamer, the fresh arrival of a vessel from home, or, just recently, the occasional radio broadcast picked up if the vessel happened to have a receiving set aboard, are now enabled to get a budget of news and weather reports especially prepared and broadcast for them daily, through the activities of the eastern fisheries branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries.

Twice each day from the Halifax Lightship and from the wireless station at Louisbourg, weather, bait and news reports are broadcast from those two points solely for the benefit of those of the fishing fleet on the banks that have been fitted with radio receiving sets.

Strong agitation for a broadcast of weather reports to the vessels for the fishing fleet, arose after the disastrous storm of August 24, 1927, when half a dozen schooners and over one hundred men were lost in the vicinity of Sable Island.
