

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Feb. 3. -Despite the fact that his name has been linked intimately with one of the most daring aerial exploits of history, T H. "Doc." Kincade, motor expert, has a "horror of airplanes" and wouldn't get into one unless he had to.
