EXTINGUISHES FOREST FIRES AND PROVES GODSEND TO FARMERS AFTER LONG DRY SPELL

Recent heavy rains in the Bulkley Valley have "soused" a number of extensive forest fires which have menaced the district around Smithers for almost a month and there is now not a single fire burning in the interior, states R. H. Leighton, fire inspector for the forest branch, who returned to the city on yesterday afternoon's train after having been away since early in June directing the fighting of the fires. A large number of men were called into service to aid in the fighting operations but all have now been released. One of the most serious fires was that which burned up Driftwood Creek, north of Smithers, for several weeks and had a large crew fighting it.

Incidentally, the arrival of rain has proven a Godsend for the farmers although the long spell of excessively dry and hot weather did irreparable damage to the crops of hay particularly.
