

cents, was invented. The annual budget amounted to 25,000,000 gold francs, but almost 300,000 francs were made on exchange each year, as the League made its disbursements in Swiss francs. As the gold franc was not in current use, the American dollar was utilized for all general purposes of payment, being the only monetary unit that showed no change from before and during the war. It was therefore suggested that their contributions might be made by drawing drafts on New York. When received at Geneva, Sir Herbert Ames auctioned them off between four banks, one being a French-Swiss, another a German-Swiss, a third being a British bank and the fourth a French institution, the best bidder getting the draft.

Sir Herbert explained that his first budget, which was to carry the League secretariat over the winter of 1919-20, amounted to £250,000, but that considerable difficulty was experienced in collecting the money. His first letters, drafted in a business-like and brief manner, were turned down by the diplomatic censor as being too direct. It was pointed out to the financial director that the League of Nations must take the attitude of an inferior communicating with a superior; that it cannot ask for anything, but must only hint.
