NOBILE WAS INJURED WHEN AIRSHIP FELL

ALL RECOVERED EXCEPT THE CHIEF TECHNICIAN WHOSE LEG WAS HURT

ROME, June 14.—General Nobile himself was injured on the right arm and leg when the Italia's gondola was torn from her. The general reported himself cured, however. Others injured were Dr. Finn Malmgren, Swedish meteorologist, who had had convulsions of the arm which are now cured, and chief technician Tecioni, whose right leg was broken requiring long attention before it can be cured.

Malmgren was one of the party of three who left the Nobile party May 30 in an effort to reach land and for whom fears are now felt.

DEFENCE FOR POLICE FORCE

NONE BETTER THAN CHIEF LONG OF VANCOUVER IN MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION SAYS WITNESS
WOMEN CORROBORATE

VANCOUVER, June 14.—Subordinate officers at police headquarters did not support Chief Long as they should have done, according to evidence of Detective Rod McLeod at the afternoon session of the Vancouver police inquiry yesterday. Two officials, Deputy Chief Dan Leatherdale and Inspector John Jackson were particularly mentioned by McLeod in this respect. The deputy chief, he said, "sheltered himself behind the office of chief."

The detective declared that Jackson's attitude in saying that McLeod and Grant had better leave the gambling situation alone was an example of the "office of chief" by that official. While praising Chief Long as an honest, upright man, McLeod declared that official was not a "police officer." Mrs. L. D. Harris, police woman inspector, described both Chief Long and Deputy Leatherdale as "white upright men." There were none better in the ministerial association, she said.

Mrs. Harris testified that Chief Long has always done everything to co-operate with women on the force in their work. Miss Eva Pelton, police woman, corroborated the evidence of Mrs. Harris. She said the chief wanted to see a clean city.

Canada Driving Washington Farmers from Grain Market Owing to Cheap Production in This Country Claimed
SEATTLE, June 14.—Canadian competition in grain growing has become a "dangerous factor" in agrarian development in Washington, J. Carl Maney, state secretary of the Farm Bureau, testified yesterday before the interstate commerce commission hearing. He asserted that aid was given farmers by the Canadian railroads and the government was attracting growers from the state of Washington to Canada with cheap land, low taxes, low grain rates and fertilizer. Alberta ranchers could, not only raise grain at a cost of several dollars an acre less than those of Washington, Maney said, but they could reach both eastern and western markets at much less cost. He said there was a wide spread in favor of Canadian grain growers which was rapidly driving eastern Washington from the export market.

G. G. McGEER CAUSES STIR

APPROACHES DOOR OF CONSERVATIVE ASSOCIATION ASKING FOR MEMBERSHIP

VANCOUVER, June 14.—Appearing at the door of the Young Conservative Association's headquarters last night, G. G. McGeer, K.C., formerly prominent in the circles of the Liberal party, caused a sensation by telling members of the organization that he wished to join the Association and take the platform to make a statement. The meeting referred the matter to a committee and this morning an application blank was mailed to Mr. McGeer.
