make a survey of the industries in the province. He failed to see where the present government had not made all the required surveys.

Dr. MacLean also dealt with the Pacific Great Eastern Railway regarding his policy of disposing of that road and expressing his hope that negotiations now under way that end in view would end successfully. He referred to the fact that the Kamloops Conservative convention, with 500 delegates in attendance, two days in session and passing many resolutions, had had nothing to say upon that—the greatest problem that was facing the province today.

success at the polls. Where could the government's opponents look for support. Surely not to Labor or to the women for whom so much had been done by this government. He expressed confidence that when election day arrived the government would be returned with a substantial majority.

**WORK OF MINISTER**

Dr. MacLean, in the course of his address, referred to the ability of the service that had been given the province by Mr. Pattullo with whom he had been associated for the past twelve years, the two of them now being the sole remaining members of the original Brewster cabinet who were still in the government. Mr. Pattullo was held in the highest regard not only by his colleagues in the government but by the members of the legislature and the people of the province at large. Mr. Pattullo was a citizen of the highest type, an excellent administrator, a good speaker, loyal to his friends and, above all, loyal to Northern British Columbia and the city of Prince Rupert particularly. At the time of the passing of the late lamented Premier Oliver, there was a considerable mass of public opinion that Mr. Pattullo should succeed him.

**MR. PATTULLO**

Mr. Pattullo was given an ovation by the audience when he was called upon by the chairman. The main address of the evening having been given by the Premier, Mr. Pattullo did not speak at length and dealt largely with matters of local interest. He referred to the fact that it was the fifth time he had been honored with this nomination by the people of Prince Rupert. Returned four times already, he felt confident that he would be returned again.

Mr. Pattullo referred to the fact that there might be criticism that, in his capacity as a minister, he had not paid enough attention to his constituency. It was pointed out, his duty as a minister to deal fairly with all other parts of the province and he was sure that the people here were not desirous that he should discredit this riding by not carrying out that duty.

He referred to criticism of his administration that had been made by the Vancouver Province, particularly in connection with the question of water in which it had been the policy that all the municipalities surrounding Vancouver should be fairly treated. This criticism, he held, had been but a lever to prejudice public opinion against the government.

As to Vancouver complaints that that city had had no cabinet representation, Mr. Pattullo declared that Vancouver had nevertheless had splendid representation and that city had been well treated. He himself, he felt, had been just as sympathetic a minister for Vancouver as one from that city would have been. He was sure that local people expected he would be fair to Vancouver.

**SELECTION UNANIMOUS**

Mr. Pattullo referred briefly to the succession as Premier of Dr. MacLean to the late Hon. John Oliver. Dr. MacLean had been unanimously selected and he had the greatest amount of confidence that his government would be sustained in the coming election. Getting down to local issues, Mr. Pattullo stated that it was no use denying that the people here were not satisfied with the progress that had been made.

He recounted some of the circumstances, beyond the control of any one man, which had mitigated against the progress of Prince Rupert. Nevertheless, he was imbued with just as great confidence in the future here as he ever had and he believed that he had some knowledge of conditions.

Mr. Pattullo felt that the provincial government had given proper consideration to this city and district. There were trails to the mines in the north, roads for the farmers in the central interior. After considerable opposition, he had had success in obtaining the Court House of this city, a building which was a weight and anchor, an ornament and a fine utility to the city. Though there had been agreement that this court house should be built, the former government had not acted upon it.

**WATERFRONT CONDITIONS**

The minister of lands referred to waterfront conditions here and pointed out that the government had already agreed to turn over a strip of waterfront at the foot of McBride Street to the city.

The Salt Lake Park was another asset that had been obtained by his government for the benefit of the people of Prince Rupert.

**ROAD WORK TO CONTINUE**

Possibly, Mr. Pattullo said, it might have been some advantage for Prince Rupert to have been represented by a minister in the matter of the highway out of this city. He had demanded that Prince Rupert be included in the road program and it had been so included despite the adverse reports of engineers as to difficulties of construction, etc. He had fought for that road which was now being built. "And I want to say here in front of the Prime Minister," asserted Mr. Pattullo, "that work is to continue upon that road every year until it is finally through." (Applause). Work was already in progress from the Hazelton end.

Mr. Pattullo referred briefly to the Pacific Great Eastern Railway and stated that it was of utmost importance to Prince Rupert as well as other parts of the province that it should be disposed of. Satisfactory negotiations with that end in view had now been entered into between Premier MacLean and the federal government. "The completion of the P.G.E. will not mean loss of business from Prince Rupert to Vancouver," asserted Mr. Pattullo. "The sooner we dispose of it the sooner will there be development here and I might state here that I have in my mind definite proposals for developments here when the Pacific Great Eastern is disposed of."

Mr. Pattullo mentioned the water power surveys which were now being undertaken in this district. Water supply was one of the main requisites of this city and there was no question that, with it, industries could be obtained. A mistake had been made when the citizens many years ago had rejected a proposal along these lines. "But, if results of the present surveys are as anticipated, I will have some suggestions to make which I think will be beneficial to the city of Prince Rupert," Mr. Pattullo said.

"The Pacific Great Eastern," Mr. Pattullo concluded, "in my judgment is the important thing that must be settled now. It is unfinished business and I believe it would be indeed unfortunate to change your board of directors at this time. Talk of a change of government is silly, anyway. Continuity of
